A SLAUGHTER OF THE FILIPINOS

According to an English Telegram

SAYS THEY LOST THOUSANDS
OF THEIR MEN.

Americans Expected the Attack and
were Prepared.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

LONDON, Feb. 6.—A telegram to the Post says the engagements have proved a veritable slaughter for the Filipinos, their killed being reported at thousands.

The American forces could scarcely have been better disposed.

It is now known that the attack was fully expected and that every preparation had been made to meet the contingency.

The firing slackened at noon on Sunday the enemy being apparently demoralized.

The American troops, however, are fully equipped to meet another attack.

Delagoa Bay Dispute.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—The Berne correspondent of the Pall Mall Gazette telegraphs that the decision of the arbitrators in the Delagoa Bay dispute may be expected no later than June. It is added that the United States threatens in the event of further delay, to make grave representations to the Federal Council, which appointed the arbitrators, and that Great Britain will join in these representations. The interest of the United States in the Delagoa Bay Railroad arbitration is due to the fact that the interests of the late Col. McMurdo are involved in it.

THE FILIPINOS RISE AT LAST AND ATTACK THE AMERICANS.

A Battle Began in the Dark on Saturday Night

AT DAYLIGHT THE AMERICANS CHARGED AND DEFBATED
THEIR ENEMY.

Twenty Americans Killed and One Hundred and Twenty-five Wounded,
Enemy's Loss Unknown.

MANILA, Feb. 6.—The long expected rupture between the Americans and the Filipinos has come at last.

The clash came at 8.45 on Saturday evening when three daring Filipinos dived past the Nebraska regiments pickets at Santa Mesa, but returned when challenged.

They repeated the experiment without drawing the sentrie's fire, but the third time they returned Corporal Greeley challenged the Filipinos and then fired killing one of them and wounding another.

Almost immediately afterwards, the Filipinos line from Calverran to Santa Mesa commenced a fusillade against the Americans which was ineffective.

The Nebraska, Montana and North Dakota outposts replied vigorously and held their ground until reinforcements arrived. The Filipinos in the meantime concentrated at three points, Gazalaugin, Calvoacan and Santa Mesa.

At about 10 o'clock, the Filipinos opened a hot fire from all three places simultaneously.

This was supplemented by the fire of two siege guns at Balik-Balik, and by advancing skirmishers at Paco and Pandocan.

The Americans responded with a terrific fire; but, owing to the darkness, they were unable to determine its effect. The engagement lasted over an hour.

The cruiser Charleston and the gunboat Concord, stationed off Malabon, opened fire from their second battalion on the Filipinos position at Calverran and kept it up vigorously.

At 2.45 there was another fusillade along the entire line, and the monitor Monadnock opened fire on the enemy from off Malata.

With daylight the Americans advanced. The Californian and Washington regiments made a splendid charge and drove the Filipinos from the village of Paco and Santa Mesa. The Nebraska regiment also distinguished itself, capturing several prisoners and one howitzer, and very strong position at the reservoir which is connected with the water works.

The Kansas and Dakota regiments compelled the enemy's right flank to retire on Calverran.

There was intermittent firing from various points all day long.

The losses of the Filipinos cannot be estimated at present but they are known to be considerable.

The American losses are estimated at twenty men killed and one hundred and twenty five wounded.

Ygorstes (natives) armed with bows and arrows, made a very determined stand under a hot artillery fire, and left many dead on the field.

Several attempts were made in this city yesterday evening to assassinate American officers.

General Otis Reports

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The following despatch from General Otis has been made public:—

Feb. 5.—Insurgents in large forces opened an attack on our outer lines at 8.45 last evening, renewed the attack several times during the night.

At 4 o'clock this morning the entire line was engaged.

All the attacks were repulsed, and at day-break we advanced against the insurgents and have driven them beyond the lines they formerly occupied, capturing several villages and their defence works.

The insurgents loss in dead and wounded is large. Our own casualties, thus far, are estimated at one hundred and seventy five. Very few fatalities.

The troops are enthusiastic and acting fearlessly.

The navy did splendid execution on the flanks of the enemy.

The city is held in check and absolute quiet prevails. The insurgents have secured a good many Mauser rifles, and a few field pieces and quick firing guns with ammunition during last month.

"The insurgents here inaugurated a general engagement yesterday and last night, which was continued to-day.

The American army and navy is generally successful. The insurgents have been driven back and our line advanced. No casualties in the navy.
