Excitement Over a Halifax "Find."

HALIFAX, Aug. 6. A ghastly discovery was made by some men who were working on the ash dump last night. Who's emptying a load of ashes they discovered a woman's left arm. The limb was not very much decayed, but the flesh was blackened and filthy from having been buried in the earth or ashes. It bears no marks of having been cut off, but looks as though it had been torn or twisted out of its socket in the body. This is, doubtless, the first intimation of a body tragedy which has been perpetrated in this city. The discovery has created great excitement, and the police are eagerly seeking for the remaining portions of the body, which, doubtless, are hid in the neighborhood of the place whence the load of ashes came.

E. I.

TORONTO, Aug. 6. At a Toronto hotel fire, a man named Brown was burned to death, and two of the servants had to jump from a second-story window to save their lives. The loss amounts to \$12,000.

LONDON, Aug. 6. The Tories are furious over what they characterize as "Chamberlain's treachery," in countenancing any opposition to the reelection of Home Secretary Matthews in Birmingham.
