

Female Accused Bound Over On Abusive Language Count

A one-year suspended sentence was handed down by Magistrate James Haslam to Rita Matthews, Charlottetown, when she appeared in city police court yesterday on a charge of using abusive language.

The accused was also ordered to post a bond and promise to keep the peace for the duration of the sentence. Matthews was bound over to the court for 12 months for the same offence.

Another woman appearing at the session, Pauline MacDonaid, Charlottetown, was charged with assaulting her sister, Susie MacDonaid, but because the complainant did not appear in court, the magistrate dismissed the charge, and ordered that court costs be paid by the complainant.

The case of Francis B. MacDonald, Charlottetown, charged with theft of articles valued at less than \$50, was adjourned until this morning.

DRUNK AND DISORDERLY Robert Stinson, Charlottetown, was fined \$25 and costs for 15 days on a charge of being drunk and disorderly.

A similar charge laid against August E. Quinn, Charlottetown, by Herbert Connolly, was withdrawn at the request of the crown.

Gov't Intrusion in Health Field Deplored in Address

J. A. MacMillan, M.D., senior partner of the Charlottetown Clinic and head of the department of surgery at the Charlottetown Hospital was guest speaker at the weekly luncheon meeting of the Rotary in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Dr. MacMillan, who was introduced by chairman R. E. Selinger and thanked by the chairman R. MacGillivray, spoke on "Medicine".

"More than 1,000 persons in this province are now in hospital and one out of every five doctors has to do with health services available under government auspices. Some regard this as a government intrusion into the health field," the speaker said.

"Some believe sincerely that the government should control production and distribution of services for people of the country but we know that this country and the United States were not built that way, but on the contrary erected certain safeguards against taking anything a man owns."

DR. J. A. MACMILLAN believe what has happened in Saskatchewan, where there is no longer a doctor in private practice.

"After touching on the situation in England, the speaker said that in 1948 it was an ambitious program for any young doctor to go to England or Germany for post-graduate work but the position is now reversed. Our system of medicine is the best in the world and young doctors are coming to this continent for their post-graduate work," he said.

"No hospitals have been built in England since the war." \$4,000 VOTED On the recommendation of the board of directors, the club voted \$4,000 towards the work of the Rehabilitation Council which is rapidly expanding to include treatment for all cases brought forward by the medical profession of the province.

Frozen Food Plant Scene Of Burglary

Thieves struck at the P.E.I. Frozen Foods Company plant in Sherwood, early Sunday night or early Monday, and made off with about \$40 in cash and set a trail of damage.

Sherwood Police Constable John Norton said the thieves broke into the plant through the main window, smashed open a soft drink machine, and took a cash register from the employees' canteen.

Paul-Emile Cardinal Leger, speaking at a conference Service of Witnesses, told them "we sense deeply this evening the common bond of fellowship that draws us together in spite of our divisions."

A Presbyterian minister, Rev. Ronald Rowat, read the scripture lessons in French and a Catholic priest, Rev. Russell Brown, in English.

Before the closing prayers massed choirs, Catholic, Anglican, Protestant and Greek Orthodox, sang the Lord's Prayer in French under Orthodox choir-master Remus Trineau.

Cardinal Leger said the churches must witness to the world and give witness of unity in Christ, otherwise "the 20th century may well lose its opportunity of salvation."
