Sees No Point In Game Between Vs, Canadiens

MONTREAL (CP) — Managing director Frank Selke of Montreal Canadiens said Tuesday he could see no point to a game between the Canadiens and the Montreal National Hockey League club. Selke said suggestions had been made that the Vs play against Canadiens or other NHL clubs. "Just what good purpose would be served by playing them and knocking them off?" he asked in an interview. "What could the Vs gain in such a game? They won the so-called world championship, and all credit to them, but why have them play a big league pro team?" Selke said he would consider sending Canadiens to central Europe only in the sense of a goodwill tour.

"We could show how we engage in sports both in Canada and the United States; how we can meet in competition and try to beat the jabbers out of each other. When it's all over, that's that."

DON'T KNOW
The Russians don't know sportsmanship as we know it. "I wouldn't want any part of something where hockey is used for terrorism or spite or engenders political squabbles. Here sport is organized for the pleasure of the people who enjoy it. If Toronto Maple Leafs or Canadiens or any other NHL club could make a between-seasons trip to Europe—travelling first-class, not barnstorming—to demonstrate how hockey can be played, we are willing to talk turkey. But I would not go for any political propaganda or grudge games."

"At the same time we would consider it a privilege, if the Russians would come over here."
