

# Will Not Restrict Flow Of Canadian Goods To Europe

TUCKER'S TOWN, Bermuda (CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent will receive assurances from British Prime Minister Macmillan here next week that the United Kingdom has no intention of trying to restrict the flow of Canadian goods to European markets. He also will likely be asked for

Canada's views on participation as a full member or only as an observer—in a North Atlantic parliamentary assembly, first proposed formally last December by Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd. The Canadian government has been worried about the possible effects of the European common market and the proposed free trade area of Canadian markets in Europe. Britain is not a member of the common market, a principal feature of which is a customs union, but wants to participate in the free trade area if certain conditions are met.

The chief conditions are that overseas territories of member nations be excluded from the area and that agricultural products be excluded from the agreement. An accord between the United Kingdom and other European nations on these conditions would mean that Canadian agricultural products, chiefly wheat, would not be frozen out of the British market.

**EXPECTED MONDAY**  
The Canadian prime minister, Trade Minister C. D. Howe and External Affairs Minister L. B. Pearson are scheduled to arrive here Monday for 1½ days of meetings with Macmillan, Lloyd and other British officials.

# "Surrender Is Not Tolerable" Churchill Told Wavell, 1941

LONDON (Monday) (CP)—In the critical days of the 1941 African desert campaign, Winston Churchill ordered British generals and staff officers to get into the fight with their pistols if cornered. The fight-to-the-last ditch order was revealed in the official United Kingdom history of the Second World War. The second volume was published today.

The history disclosed that Churchill as the wartime prime minister was deeply shaken by British reverses in Greece, the loss of the island of Crete and the German thrust in North Africa led by Nazi Field Marshal Erwin Rommel.

Churchill said in a directive to Field Marshal Wavell (now Earl Wavell), then in command, that "surrender is not tolerable" and "there must be no thought of retreat" at the border. The prime minister was concerned over the vast amount of military equipment assembled in Egypt which, he said, could not be saved by the transport available if the Germans broke through.

"No surrenders by officers or men will be considered tolerable unless at least 50 per cent casualties are sustained by the unit or force in question," the Churchill directive said. "Generals and staff officers surprised by the enemy are to use their pistols in self-defence."

The volume, written by J.R.N. Butler, formerly professor of modern history at Cambridge University, relates that Churchill's dissatisfaction with the command in North Africa started in this period. Wavell was replaced by Gen. Sir Claude Auchinleck. The ultimate British drive across North Africa was led by Field Marshal (now Viscount) Montgomery.

# CONTRACT BRIDGE

North dealer.  
Both sides vulnerable.

**NORTH**  
♦ 10 7 2  
♥ Q 10 5 3  
♦ A 7  
♠ A J 10 8

**EAST**  
♠ 9 8 6  
♥ K 6

**SOUTH**  
♠ K J

The bidding:  
North East South West  
Pass Pass 1♥ 1♠  
3♥ Pass 4♥

Opening lead—king of diamonds. The safety play in bridge assumes so many different forms that it is impossible to enumerate all the possible variations. The one which exists in this hand is well off the beaten track, but the general principle that governs the use of safety plays is no different in this case than it is in the common garden variety.

Once the king of diamonds is led, declarer sees there is a sure losing diamond, either one or two spade losers, and probably either another trump loser. From the worst view, therefore, South is down.

Declarer notes, though, that there is a good chance of losing only one trump trick, and also

notes that the fourth club in dummy provides a berth for one of his losing spades. He observes, at the same time, that if East never obtains the lead the spade discard on dummy's fourth club cannot be prevented.

All declarer's plans, therefore, must be shaped so that East does not come into the lead. In line with this policy, South allows the king of diamonds to hold the opening lead.

West can do no better now than continue with a diamond, and declarer is in dummy at trick two. The ticklish trump situation must be now tackled. Following the original plan, a low heart is played from dummy and the nine is finessed.

West wins with the jack and (assume) returns another diamond. Dummy trumped the queen of hearts is played, picking up East's king, and the contract is made. Losses are a diamond, a heart and a spade.

Suppose declarer does not play safe but plunges blindly ahead by winning the opening lead and playing the ace and another trump. East wins the heart trick and returns a spade to beat the contract, declarer losing two spades, a heart and a diamond.

The normal play with this trump combination is to lead the ace and another trump, but the safety of the contract is a factor that must also be considered. There should be willingness to lose a trump trick, but not to the wrong opponent.
