The Charlottetown Intermediate Abbies went one game up on the Holman's Intermediates yesterday afternoon as they downed the Summerside nine 5-2 in the first game of the best three out of five baseball series for the Island Intermediate A baseball championship.

The one-two punch of Whitlock and Matheson was a bit too much for Holman's. Each batted in two runs, Whitlock with a triple and single and Matheson with a circuit swipe in the seventh. Chuckle-headed base running robbed Holman of a good chance for the seventh when MacKenzie stormed down to second with MacKay already occupying the keystone sack. DesRoches was on third and there began a three-man run-down play culminating in DesRoches's being thrown out at the plate. MacKenzie hit a re-entree home-run in the third with no one on. Holman's got their other counter when Dutch Underwood, pinch-hitter de luxe, came through in his usual style with a single in the ninth. After the next two batters struck out MacKay got his third single of the afternoon, scoring Underwood. Both McAleer and Bernard were hit hard but the Abbies managed to bunch their tallies more effectively.

## Winnipeg Girl Wins Pro Swimming Title In Race With 20 Entries

TORONTO, Sept. 5 (CP)—Vivian King, blonde, 20-year-old Winnipeg department store clerk, won the women's world professional swimming championship at the Canadian National Exhibition today.

She climbed out of the water for the \$1,500 first prize and an extra \$150 for leading at the end of every mile as fresh as when she plunged in along with 19 other entries.

Miss King covered the three-mile course in 66-degree water in one hour, 23 minutes and one second—less than two minutes off the record of one hour, 21 minutes, and 24 seconds set in 1937.

Second was Lies Pitt, unheralded 23-year-old swimmer from Montreal, who was accompanied to the finish-barge by a foot-long lamprey eel. It had clung to her leg all through the swim.

Said Miss Pitt, whose first concern was the eel, not the \$750 second prize: "I couldn't get rid of the thing and I could feel it dangling around my leg. It wouldn't have been so bad except I'm terrified of things like that."

Mrs. Irene Barr Van-Fleet, 28, of Toronto was third, with Mrs. Marion Townsend of Hamilton fourth, Mrs. Van-Fleet won \$500 and Mrs. Townsend \$300.

One of the youngest entries in the minor marathon, 13-year-old Faith Mercer of Tiverton, R.I., took fifth prize of \$200 and another member of the "Swimming Mercers," Faith's 23-year-old sister Althea, won \$100 for sixth position.

Two of the 20 starters were removed from the race. Mrs. Joyce MacRae Hawryluk of San Francisco, in third place at the end of the first mile, was pulled from the water with cramps at the 1-2-mile mark. Then Mrs. Lois May of Toronto also was helped into a rescue boat.

Clear skies and mild weather brought a crowd of some 6,000 to watch Miss King, winner of the Canadian amateur championships last week at the exhibition, take her first professional race with a quarter-mile lead after heading the swimmers from the start.
