

pledged her support to Italy, in the event of a rupture of friendly relations between that country and France. It is known that there is a crisis in the relations between France and Prussia, which causes much uneasiness and apprehensions in monetary circles.

Gen. Menabrea, Prime Minister of Italy, in a note justifies the advance of the Italian troops into the Papal territory. He says the dignity of the Italian Government and the violation of the September Treaty by the French required this movement.

The trial of General Warren for complicity in Fenianism is concluded. He was found guilty of treason and felony. To the summons of the King, Garibaldi replies by refusing to disband his army or give up his enterprise against Rome unless a change is made in the present reactionary Ministry, which will put the Government of Italy in accord with the national will.

Dublin, Nov. 1st.—Great excitement has been caused here by the shooting of two policemen on Wednesday night. A proclamation has been issued by the Government, offering a reward of £1000 for the arrest of the assassins. The police in this city and throughout the Island are searching for the murderers. Two suspected persons have already been apprehended, and are now in custody awaiting examination.

London, Nov. 1.—As the last mail steamer was leaving Rio Janeiro, a report reached that city that the Brazilian troops had captured the town of Pilar—called by the natives Neembun, the chief port of Paraguay. It was also reported that many prisoners and a great quantity of military stores had fallen into their hands.

Florence, Nov. 1.—The Nations of this morning denies the truth of the rumor that French troops have arrived at Rome. The Italian army, which has entered the Papal territory, is under command of Gen. Cialdini. Garibaldi has retired from Monterotondo. He sends no reply to the summons of the Italian Government to disarm his volunteers.

The marriage of King George of Greece to the Princess Olga took place to-day with great pomp and ceremony. The Moniteur of to-day, says that the Emperor Napoleon has demanded of King Victor Emmanuel an explanation of the invasion of the Roman territory by the Italian forces.

At the last accounts from the South, Garibaldi remained at Monterotondo, with a force estimated at 5000 strong. The police have taken possession of and closed the bureau of the National party, and the headquarters of the relief organization at Florence and elsewhere, by order of the Italian Government.

The Provincial Correspondence, a journal possessing a semi-official character, says Prussia will interfere in the Roman difficulty should such action on her part be necessary to preserve the peace of Europe.

From Mexico. New York, Nov. 1st.—Intelligence from the city of Mexico says at the present moment Mexico enjoys more freedom from petty internal strife than she has done for years before. There being perfect quiet throughout the whole Republic—except in the state of Guadalupe, where Juarez continues the trouble. Santa Anna's trial has been concluded, and he has been condemned to death. Through his Counsel he has asked to be pardoned and banished, a prayer which the press call upon the President to grant, declaring that it would be a terrible act to execute the General, in view of some of the good and valiant deeds he has performed for Mexico, and brutal to carry out the sentence of death upon an old and decrepit man. He will probably be banished or imprisoned for life.

WESTMORLAND FAIR. The above Fair came off on the 23rd inst., as advertised, and although there was every appearance of a continuous rainy day, yet it cleared off in the afternoon. Upwards of one thousand persons collected in a very short time. Never was there a scene of more active operations for the time allowed to set off the articles to the best advantage, but really had not an opportunity to attend to the exhibition. The hall was crowded to excess. Mr. Henry Palmer, as Agent for her Ladyship, the proprietor of the Lot, under whose generous gift, in the shape of premiums, the Fair took place, after receiving all the things for exhibition, opened the Fair in a short but effective speech, complimenting the exhibitors, etc. on that being the first thing of the kind introduced out of Charlottetown, and the many advantages to be derived from similar institutions; hoped it would be continued, and that its bounds would be increased by a small Legislative grant that would enable them another year to include, say four Townships, viz: Townships Nos. 27, 28, 29 and 30, so as to make the thing more general.

Cornelius Howat, Esq., and D. Cameron, Esq., two members of Parliament, quite agreed with Mr. Palmer, and heartily congratulated him on the success he had met with, and promised their concurrence in a grant from the Legislature next year.

The young horse produced by Cornelius Lowther, the Mare by Thomas Myers, and the fat Cow by the Rev. Mr. Sterns and Mr. McKie, were equal to any we have seen at this time of the year. The Sheep and Pigs were very fine, particularly a Sow produced by Mr. James Howat, and a Boar by Mr. Geo. Howat, were a credit to their settlement. The Carts and Ploughs were not quite equal to some we have seen made in Charlottetown; but a Potato Digger, made by Mr. G. Lowther, was a credit to him; in fact, Mr. Lowther's family are quite celebrated for their Thrashing Machines, Mowing Machines and Horse Rakes; they deserve the hearty thanks of the farmers generally. So much for the articles outside the Hall. We next turned our attention to the inside, and there we had a fine display of Cloths of all colors and shades, both in men and women's wear, Socks, Stockings, Bed Quilts, Rugs, Table Cloths, &c., &c. There was not so many samples of Grain as might have been expected; this was owing to many supposing the Fair would be put off. The Oats weighed 4 1/2 lbs. per bushel. The butter was very good; there were from 20 to 30 tubs, and it was hard to distinguish the best. The Cheese was very good, but not superior to that made by the Hydes. The Pumpkins, Turnips, Beets, Squashes, Carrots, &c., were very excellent.

The Fair was concluded, all in good hopes of a continuance of another next year.
