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Thoughts For Our Time

The balmy days of summer are here again. Many who have been working hard over the winter months at office desks or factory benches are now keenly anticipating hours of swimming at the lake, or fishing at the favorite spots, the gay sunlight of a care-free morning, the refreshing breeze of a warm evening—in short, all the pleasures which they associate with their cottage at the lake, or their favorite summer resort.

One cannot help but wonder how many pleasure-seekers, who at other times call themselves Christians, will also take a holiday from their Christianity. How many will be so taken up by the continual rounds of pleasure that they will leave no time for the worship of God, either public or private? Or again, how many will use the summer vacation as an excuse to sin against the moral law of God which they ordinarily recognize?

It is greatly to be feared, moreover, that many of these unrestrained pleasure-seekers will try to reassure their consciences with "God is merciful," or "God does not expect..." or some equivalent of these.

One of the things about God, of which men became more aware when His Son came, and dwelt among them, was His love for them, and His mercy towards sinners. One of the great truths that is specifically Christian is the special love which God cherishes towards all men.

CHARITY OF GOD It was only right and fitting that the revelation of this truth be left incomplete until the coming of Our Lord into the world, because it was not until His expression of God's love would be made. "By this hath the charity of God appeared towards us, because God hath sent His only begotten Son into the world, that we may live by Him." In this we have known the charity of God, because He hath laid down His life for us. "Greater love than this no man hath, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

It was pre-eminently by His sacrificial death, by His atonement for the debt incurred by men's sins, that Our Lord would express the divine love. All of His life

was a preparation for this moment. Men's minds had to be prepared to recognize this act as truly an act of sacrificial love. And so men heard from His lips the beautiful parable of the Good Shepherd, and of how this Shepherd leaves His ninety-nine sheep to search for the one which was lost; and they heard the vindictive Pharisees confounded with, "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her."

And how many times did they not hear, "Arise and walk!" or an even more generous "Thy sins are forgiven thee." All these words and deeds of mercy were a preparation for men, that they might understand the true meaning of the mission of the Son of God upon earth.

WISHLFUL THINKING However, if we were to conclude that God's only attitude toward sin is one of merciful forgiveness, and thereby absolve ourselves of all need of avoiding sin, we should be guilty of soft wishful thinking. And we should find how wrong we were if we were only to listen to other things said by the same Jesus.

For instance, He said, "Every idle word that men shall speak, they shall render an account for it on the day of judgment." Here, and elsewhere, Our Lord even indicates that God is now going to demand a higher type of perfection than the Law, which He had given to the Jews through Moses.

Had demanded. Where it had required rectitude only of external visible actions, He now was going to require perfection even in the hidden depths of man's soul: "But I say to you, that whosoever is angry with his brother, shall be in danger of the judgment"; and again, "But I say to you, that whosoever shall look on a woman to lust after her, hath already committed adultery with her in his heart." "And if thy right eye scandalize thee, pluck it out and cast it from thee. For it is expedient for thee that one of thy members should perish, rather than that thy whole body be cast into hell."

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
