Teletype Consultation Viewed For Hospitals

ALBERTON — The possibility of instant consultation facilities through an interlocking system of teletype machines in the various hospitals and central laboratory of the province was urged at a meeting of the advisory board of trustees of the Western Hospital in Alberton Wednesday evening.

Harvey Hutt, Alberton, and Albert Saunders, Bloomsburg, have been acting as a committee for the past month investigating this possibility with the hospitals involved and the telephone company. A full report is to be tabled at the next regular meeting.

It was reported that the work of the X-ray department had been increased to a considerable degree with some 342 separate patients handled during the month of November.

The proposed budget for the year 1965 now seems to be in the area of \$191,000 as compared to the actual operating costs of last year which were \$175,000.

City Y's Men Given Plaque For Services

Mrs. Fred Osborne, local representative of the Unitarian Service Committee, presented an award to the Charlottetown Y's Mens Club at its weekly meeting in the YMCA last night. Club president Glen Kennedy accepted the award which is in the form of a plaque inscribed as follows: "To gratefully record outstanding services voluntarily rendered by the Y's Mens Club of Charlottetown to the Unitarian Service Committee of Canada".

The plaque is signed by Bowler Cary, national chairman of the Unitarian Service Committee of Canada, and is dated Ottawa, Oct. 22, 1964. The Charlottetown Y's Men have been active for several years in helping to collect, pack and create articles of clothing, and in transporting same to shipping depots for transportation overseas for Unitarian relief.

Greek Freighter Awaits Rescue At Sea Cow Head

SUMMERBIDE — The freighter Agios Nicholas still remains aground off Sea Cow Head light awaiting the arrival of the ocean going tug Foundation Valiant. The Valiant, from Halifax, is on its way to aid the stricken ship. Plans were discarded to salvage the Liberian freighter Fury, 95 miles east of Halifax. The tug was expected to arrive this morning.

No further damage has developed but an official report stated the Greek vessel is carrying 1,800 tons of ballast water. Pumping ballast would entail six hours of work but Greek Captain Alexandrakas indicated that he would have to know if rescue would be at hand before the actual pumping began. The helpless ship, bound for Florida, was anchored off Sea Cow Head light, approximately 10 miles east of Summerbide when her anchor chains clipped around. Sours by wind-lashed waves. Piles of driftwood and other items from the water extended to the highway.

MV Belfast's Freed With Tanker, Tug Aid

The MV Belfast slipped free of a shoal in Charlottetown Harbor at about 9:15 last night and docked at the Railway wharf at 10 p.m. The tanker was aided in her escape from the shoal, where she grounded Wednesday morning by the Foundation Valiant, a semi-ocean going tug which came from mainland Nova Scotia behind the Imperial Oil Tanker Imperial Halifax.

The Halifax arrived in Charlottetown yesterday morning and began pumping a total of 17,000 barrels of oil from the Belfast to lighten her bow for the freeing attempt last night. The Halifax unloaded most of the 17,000 barrels at the Railway Wharf before she had to move into the stream to make room for the Belfast.

Officials of Imperial Oil said last night it would take about 48 hours to unload the Belfast and then the Halifax would move in to dump the remainder of her cargo. She carries 120,000 barrels of diesel oil and 20,000 of stove oil.

When diverted to the stranded Belfast, the Imperial Halifax was on her way from New-castle, N.B. to the Imperial refinery at Halifax, riding in ballast.

As soon as the Belfast came off the bottom, she was moved in to the railway wharf and with the aid of the Valiant she was quickly berthed.
