

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

MEETING.—Widley Lodge, I. O. O. F., meeting in regular session tonight. Initiation and other important business. A full attendance requested.

SEBEN'S DEATH.—Mrs. John Chandler, sister of Mrs. B. Toombs, died suddenly at Moncton on Wednesday morning. Heart failure was the cause.

PROHIBITION PLEASITE.—The Halifax Herald understands that the Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia are circulating a petition asking for a plebiscite on the prohibition question.

FOOTBALL.—The Dalhousie College football team won the second match of the trophy league series, played at Halifax on Wednesday, defeating the United Service team by the big score of 13 to 0.

THE KINGFISHER.—It is stated that the cruiser Kingfisher has been sold to parties in British Columbia, and that she will leave for there as soon as her charter with the Dominion Government expires.

THE RESTLER DISASTER.—The charge of manslaughter preferred against Captain Russell, of the steamer Restler, was entered into before the grand jury at Newcastle, N. B., on Wednesday, and "no bill" was found.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, George Brown, charged with the larceny of money from Mary Mallet, was ordered to be imprisoned for six months with hard labor and John Stone, seaman on board the cruiser Kingfisher, for being absent without leave, was sentenced to four weeks imprisonment with hard labor.

FOR BOSTON.—The steamer Carroll, Captain Hansen, left for Boston yesterday afternoon at half-past four o'clock. Her cargo included 121 packages sundries, 209 large potatoes, 523 barrels mackerel, and 443 cases eggs. The passengers were: W. A. Brehaut, Frank Moran, Mary Stewart, C. PROVING AN ACCIDENT.—On Tuesday afternoon two sailors belonging to the fishing schooner Laria, Shippegan, N. B., lost their lives from their vessel under peculiarly sad circumstances. The schooner was about twenty miles off Alberton at the time the accident occurred. In some way she was washed by a heavy sea which swept her decks completely, carrying the two sailors overboard. This left only the captain on the vessel who put the schooner about and tried to rescue the men. The poor fellows remained afloat for about twenty minutes, but the captain being unable to himself to manage the vessel and render them any assistance, had to give them up to their fate. The names of the drowned men are Henry Chaisson and Sabian Chaisson. One was a single man, the other leaves a widow and three children.

ATTEMPTED ARSON.—An attempt was made the other day by a pupil to burn the first and dumb institution building at Halifax. According to a despatch, two fires were discovered in the building, one at each end. Mr. Laurence, a teacher at the institution, was told by one of the inmates that a pupil had arrangements made to set fire to Mr. Laurence's room with the object of cremating him. Mr. Laurence demanded an explanation from the boy, but the latter denied all knowledge of the affair. When the person was produced to whom he gave the particulars of the plot, the boy confessed his guilt, and told Mr. Laurence that he intended to burn him. It was another inmate who set the two fires in the building, referred to above. He states that he was told to fire the building by a man who frequently visits the place seeking employment.

THE TURP.—At Lexington, Ky., a few days ago, Harrietta stepped the first mile in 2:10, making a new record for trotters in that state. The third heat in 2:09, reduced the record again and stamped Harrietta as one of the greatest trotters in training.

A match race has been arranged between Harry C. owned by Mr. H. C. Connolly, of this city, and Balston, owned by James Macdonald, V. S., of Summerside, for \$100 a side. The race will take place on or about the 28th inst. The track has not yet been decided upon.

At Nashville, Tenn., on Monday, the yearling Princess Clara made a mile in 2:26, establishing a new race record for that age. Princess Clara's previous best time was 2:34, made at New York last month. Princess Clara, the sire of Princess Clara, is by Kentucky Prince out of a full sister to Dexter. Princess Clara's dam, Reality, by Princeps, has also produced Tuscarora, who trotted in 2:22 at two years. The second dam, Roma, by Gold Dust, has three 2:30 performers to her credit.

BAPTIST YEAR BOOK.—The Baptist Year Book for 1893 has been issued. The convention of delegates from the 397 churches in the N. B., in August last, the association meetings being held during the winter and autumn. They report 397 churches (207 in Nova Scotia, 165 in New Brunswick, and 25 in Prince Edward Island) with 44,697 members; \$140,000, in round numbers, raised for local church purposes, and \$21,180 for missions. They report 1632 baptisms during the year. For foreign missions among the League of the Madras Presidency, India, the Board expended \$17,000, about \$2,400 of which was used in Home expenses. There were 14 converts reported by the 6 missionaries. The sum of \$7,358.45 was raised for home missions and paid for salaries of missionaries and grants to fields whereby 468 persons were converted. In Nova Scotia are 206 Sunday schools, with 18,136 pupils, 1,601 teachers; in New Brunswick, 185 schools, with 10,417 pupils and 981 teachers; and in P. E. Island, 24 schools with 1,245 scholars and 94 teachers.

CORNER STONE Laid.—The corner stone of the Mount Allison University residence at Sackville was laid on Wednesday afternoon by the Rev. Dr. Allison in the presence of several hundred people. The building is to be of brick, three stories high, and will cost about \$50,000.

BABY MIXED.—Advices from Alberton report that the girl convention held there yesterday wrangled all day about the admission of delegates from Duck Road and Mininighash. The convention came to nothing. It is stated that Rogers and Matheson are still in the field and will fight to the death.

MARINE NEWS.—The brig Hattie Louise, Captain King, passed Casco yesterday, eight days out from Trinidad. She is expected here tonight or early tomorrow morning.

The schr. P. L. G., Captain McLean, sailed for Casco yesterday with a cargo of 665 bushels of oats and 19 tons of hay, shipped by Messrs. Carvell Bros.

THE BEHRING SEA MATTER.—An Ottawa despatch states that Sir C. H. Tupper has formally called the attention of the governor in council to the services rendered by the following Canadian gentlemen in connection with the Behring Sea case: Dr. G. M. Dawson, Joseph Pope, Hon. W. Hamley of Victoria, Collector Milne of Victoria, J. M. Macdon of the geological survey, A. P. Sherwood, commissioner of Dominion police, R. N. Venning, C. F. Winter, and W. C. Gordon of the fisheries department. Parliament will be asked to recognize their services in a substantial manner.
