YESTERDAY afternoon, when the hearing of Mr. Bell's election objections came before Judge Fitzgerald, Mr. Bell's Counsel stated that after fully going into the matter they had come to the conclusion that the objections could not be sustained and therefore to avoid further costs, they would ask that the objections be abandoned and disallowed. Mr. Stewart Q. C., for the petitioner, asked that an order be made that Mr. Bell pay the costs incurred. The Judge ordered the objections to be dismissed and that Mr. Bell pay the costs.

ST PETER'S BOYS CLUB

Entertainment in St. Peter's Hall Last Evening.

The boys of St. Peter's Boys Club had their fun last evening, notwithstanding the storm; and there were many present to encourage them in it, including his Worship the Mayor, Mrs. Watkinson and Mrs. Hookirk. Barred by the gripe, several of the "boys" were unable to take their parts. But the entertainment was, nevertheless, a very pleasing and satisfactory one. In the vocal trio by Messrs. Hayfield, Owen and McLean we had an old friend with a new accompaniment—a vocal accompaniment, and the harmonious effect was perfect. The songs of the Rev. T. H. Hunt and Mrs. Noroon were, we need hardly say, very well rendered, and Mr. Vinnicombe played his solo with such spirit and appreciation that he was enthusiastically encored. In this part of the programme, Master Jack Noroon made his debut as a reader and elocutionist in a manner that reflected credit upon himself and his teachers and indicated decided talent. But the minstrel boys were, after all, the centre of attraction. For amateurs their entertainment was highly interesting and creditable; and the public will, we are sure, anxiously await their next appearance. CAMPBELL ELECTION TRIAL.

The trial of the election petition against the return of Hon. William Campbell, M. L. A., for the first District of Queen's County, came on before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald this morning. Mr. Arthur Peters, Q. C. and Mr. John A. McDonald appeared for the petitioners, and Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C. for Mr. Campbell. Mr. McDonald opened the case by stating that with regard to the personal charges against the respondent the petitioner found that he was unable to substantiate them, and therefore he would ask the court to dismiss them at once. That with reference to the corrupt practices alleged to have been committed by alleged agents of the respondent, while the petitioner had evidence of corrupt practices he found that he was unable to prove that the parties who committed them were agents for whose acts Mr. Campbell could be held responsible. Three of the alleged agents were absent, or could not be served with subpoenas, and a fourth, the most material one, was so ill that he could not be served. The learned Counsel therefore found himself without any evidence to offer the court in support of the petition. Mr. Stewart Q. C. for the respondent moved that the petition be dismissed with costs against the petitioner. The court ordered that the petition be dismissed with costs.

THE STORM.—The lowest temperature registered by the thermometer last night was 10 above zero. The barometer fell to an extremely low point. An average of about 13 inches of snow fell. The wind attained a velocity of from 16 to 20 miles during the night, but calmed down towards morning. It came up again with increased severity about eleven o'clock this forenoon and a heavy storm is raging at the time of our going to press.

CITY COUNCIL.—The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. Councilor Nicholson was the only absentee. A letter was read from the Secretary of the City School Board stating that the estimates of the Board for the current year amounted to \$10,090, and asking for \$1,000 on account. The Council seemed to be of opinion that greater economy was necessary in the administration of School Board affairs, and the Finance Committee was instructed to wait on the Board with a view to seeing if their estimates could not be reduced. The assessors were instructed to make the usual returns of taxable property and polls. It was decided to request the School Board to assist the Council in having an act passed vesting the title to West Kent School in the City Council.

MARRIAGE BELLS.—A very interesting and pleasant event took place at the residence of Mr. Ronald McDonald, Cherry Valley, on February 7th, inst., the occasion being the marriage of his youngest daughter, Minnie, to Mr. Henry Curran, of Pleasant Grove. The marriage ceremony was performed at St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, at eight o'clock in the morning, the Rev. Dr. Doyle officiating. The bridesmaid was Miss McDonald, of Peake's Station, and the groom was supported by Mr. John A. McDonald, brother of the bride. Dr. Doyle presided at the dinner table, with Rev. Jas. McDonald, of Hope River, uncle of the bride, in the vice-chair. Dinner being over, Dr. Doyle proposed the health of the bride and groom in his usual witty manner. Father James replied, and the toast was supported by D. McDonald and Thomas Cass. The remainder of the evening was spent in song, dance and speech-making, and all went merrily as the proverbial "marriage bell." 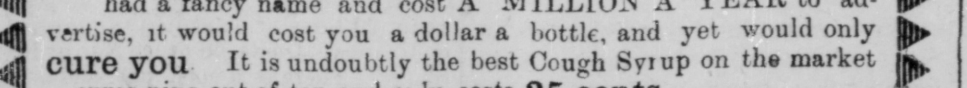
