OFFICIAL CIRCULAR TO THE COURTS OF EUROPE.
The infatuation of Russia equals herotropheg. Here, at the close of a campaign, in the course of which her arms have been subjected to every humiliation and defeat known to civilized warfare, she proposes, with a cool audacity, or an utter obliviousness of current events, to revert to the untenable position she held prior to the commencement of the war! She absolutely ignores the existence of anything in the shape of European international law, and claims the right to wreak her will upon her original victims, without the intervention of the police of diplomacy!

Telegraphic despatches from Berlin announce the publication of a circular issued by the Czar's Ministry to the representatives of Russia at the different Courts of Europe, in which is announced the construction or interpretation, in accordance with which the third of the "Ten Points" would be accepted by that Power. The conditions, as interpreted by Russia, are as follows—

- "1. The principle of closing the Straits shall be maintained.
- "2. No military flag shall be admitted into the Black Sea, except that of the several Powers, which Russia and Turkey shall judge it suitable to allow, by common accord.
- "3. The amount of the forces shall be fixed by a direct understanding between Russia and Turkey, without the ostensible participation of the other Powers."

In other words, the interference or Turkey in the Allied Powers, or of the European States, generally, is utterly repudiated; and Russia is to be left heretofore at the mercy of her enemy, more expatriated than ever against her, on account of the efforts she has made to secure the protection of her friends. If this intelligence be correct, there is an end of all hope that the pending negotiations will result in peace, or even in any serious discussion. A Ministerial organ, referring to the Czar's circular, observes that Russia consents to do "something less than the Powers assembled at Vienna declared to be necessary." This "something less" happens to be of sufficient magnitude to involve the whole question at issue between the belligerents.

The prospects of peace which we have been amused for the last month to recede before us like the lake that only exists in the mirage of the desert. While we have been agreeing on conditions, the foundation of which is the pacification of the Black Sea, and tracing on the blue of the frontier, where we are disposed to allow to our adversary, the Court of Russia has had other dreams, and announces for other grounds of negotiation. With unheard-of and intolerable insolence, Russia announces in the same breath, that she assents to the third condition of the Conference of Vienna,—that is, to put an end to her preparations for war against Russia, and that, with the view of carrying this condition into execution, she consents to exclude the fleet of the frontier, which she has disposed to leave it to be navigated by 26,000 Russian ships of war as Turkey and Russia may between themselves agree upon. Such a proposition is not an offer of peace, but a fresh outbreak of peace on such terms is a new outrage—a fresh provocation to war. What can be hoped from negotiation with a Power which, after such a series of offences as have fallen upon Russia since the close of the Vienna Conference—her armies defeated, her finances deranged, her fleet scattered, her rivers blocked, her cities besieged and blockaded,—can find no terms except such as she might impose, had victory followed her standards as perditionally as defeat? To exclude the allies from the sea, that they have made their own, in order to give back the dominion over it to a fleet that is buried beneath its treacherous waves, to purchase a power to which the principal belligerents are to be no parties, to leave the cause of European independence to the keeping of the Czarship, the impotence, or the venality of the Divan, are terms so disastrous and inglorious, that we must lose more than a million of men, before we can begin to see an stop—how before we can regard such terms as any thing else than a fresh outrage and a fresh provocation.
