Railway Collision.

BLOOMINGTON, July 27. A collision, this afternoon, on the Bridge near Hopedale, on the Alton Road, between a construction and freight train, resulted in the death of five men and injuring of seven others.

CHICAGO, July 27. The Daily News special from Pekin says:—"Ten dead bodies were taken from the wreck of the construction train at Hopedale; eight men are unaccounted for. It is supposed the missing men are dead, under the wreck."

Salisbury on Gladstone and Parnell.

LONDON, July 27. Lord Salisbury delivered a speech at Norwich this evening. He said Mr. Morley had boasted that Liberal success was assured, but he (Salisbury) doubted whether any political strength, based upon the rotten relations existing between Gladstone and Parnell could be permanent. Gladstone had argued that the whole civilized world condemned England's policy. What had Gladstone to say to the fact that the whole civilized world condemned free trade. Anyhow the Government's policy held the field Gladstone had formulated no policy.

Big Fire in Chicago.

CHICAGO, July 27. Armour's new beef house, covering nearly a square, was burned this evening with about 250,000 hides, 40,000 dressed, and 10,000 undressed, cattle, 500 dressed sheep, and 100 hogs. The loss is \$800,000; insurance \$195,000.

A Catholic University in America.

ROME, July 27. The committee appointed to elaborate a scheme for the establishment of a Catholic University in America will hold a conference August 7th to decide as to the location of the new institution.

Chinatown Burned.

At 3 o'clock, on the morning of the 25th, fire was discovered in a gambling den in Chinatown, Los Angeles, Cal. The fire companies, which were ordered out, soon appeared, but the slow action of the firemen in getting water on the flames seemed to indicate that they were not over anxious to save the buildings. The fire continued spreading until it had consumed 25 buildings, which housed 1,000 children. Intelligent Chinamen place the loss at from \$100,000 to \$175,000. There was but little insurance. Only a few days before the fire agents of insurance companies in San Francisco came down there and cancelled the insurance policies, saying that with the existing feeling against Chinese the risk was too great to continue policies. The origin of the fire is unknown.
