Minister in charge of Insurance in this Province, on behalf of the Government. They were also greeted by Mayor J. D. Stewart, of the City.

Hon. Mr. Hughes was congratulated by following speakers on his brevity while the thanks of the delegates was expressed by Mr. E. B. MacLatchey, Superintendent in New Brunswick, who said that as a member of a neighboring Province he was "not unaware" of the charms of Prince Edward Island. He humorously retold the story to the assemblage that every islander away from home lived for the day when he might return "as soon as possible." Mayor Stewart said that he welcomed the insurance men to the city which he termed a "popular meeting place" of this Canada of ours and reminded them that of all the historic places there were to be found none could compare to this. His remarks were solidly supported by several following speakers who were visiting the island for the first time. They agreed that the island not only had historic places, such as the Confederation Chamber, but many outstanding places of scenic beauty. The Mayor suggested that if the group were unable to return shortly in convention he hoped that they would return individually and bring their families.

Chief Justice Speaks

In the evening at dinner the company had the privilege of hearing His Lordship, Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell, when in a brief address he told the visitors that if they wished they might almost read the history of the Island "in bronze." The Chief Justice was referring to the fact that a large number of the historic places here have been commemorated by the Historic Sites and Monument Board with the erection of bronze plaques.

Following the president's address in the morning the balance of the session, as well as almost the entire afternoon, was given over to committee meetings during which thoroughly technical subjects pertaining to the insurance business only were discussed. They ranged from a special type of form to the difference between a broker and an agent. The latter subject proved one of the hottest of the day as many delegates took part and expressed their views.

First Time Together

It was announced by the chairman that it was the first time in the 36 years of the organization that all Provinces were represented at the annual meeting and he thought it was symbolic that such an occasion should have occurred where the Dominion of Canada was born after another meeting.

Mr. MacPhee in his formal report to the convention told of his pleasure in being here and described to the delegates the various places where they might find the tourists' natural quarry.

The convention will continue today and probably tomorrow morning in order to finish all the business before the meeting.

is \$6, one of the officials fired, said Monday that he may form a branch group of his own. "The rest of the claimants have no conception of the research involved," he snorted angrily. "They are a dense lot."

Each member of the existing "Edwards Millions Association" pays 21 cents a week into a fund which finances research work. Since the body was formed in 1949 the claimants have spent a total of \$15,980 in their hitherto fruitless quest.

The Welsh Edwards aren't the only members of the family after the estate.

Hundreds of Claimants — During the last 50 years or so, hundreds of alleged descendants from all over England, Australia, the United States and Canada have sent claims to New York's surrogate court on Robert's coveted estate.

There are reportedly several claimants to the estate in Prince Edward Island.

And all of them, according to officials of the court, are chasing something as unreal as the mythical pot of gold at the end of a rainbow.

Though the Edwardses may be sure the estate exists, the court is not. An official New York surrogate letter of reply sent to all claimants says: "We have no knowledge of such an estate and regard it as a myth."
