New Satellite Keeping Watch On World Storms

GREENBELT, Md. (AP) — The United States' latest and biggest weather satellite Sunday began sending pictures and data earthward that scientists hope will tell them something of the birth and death of storms.

The Nimbus II weather satellite was launched at 3:56 a.m. EDT from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif.

A spokesman at Goddard Space Flight Center said the satellite is in an orbit 725 miles from earth at its farthest point and 687 miles at its closest.

"It's a real good bird," he said. "Its power is good and it has stabilized."

The agency had planned a circular orbit 690 miles from earth. The satellite, which circles the earth every 108 minutes, began sending pictures back at noon. It is designed to take about 3,000 pictures a day.

Blood-Clotting Drug Revealed By Researchers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two researchers — one of them saved by a drug he helped develop — announced a new blood-clotting agent which eventually may permit chronic bleeders live normal lives.

Dr. Edward Shanbrom and Dr. G. M. Theilin of Hyland Laboratories said they have found a way of producing on a commercial scale a concentrate of antihemophilic factor (AHF) which is missing in hemophiliacs.

Hemophilia is a hereditary disorder in the body's blood-clotting mechanism. Its victims bleed internally without apparent cause, usually in the joints, and even minor cuts can be fatal because their blood is slow to clot in the wound.

Theilin, 38, is a hemophiliac. He suffered a brain hemorrhage a year ago and was treated experimentally with the AHF concentrate which he and Shanbrom said it was one of the few cases of a hemophiliac recovering from a brain hemorrhage.

Six months later Theilin began hemorrhaging from peptic ulcers and was successfully treated again with AHF.

Dr. Shelby Dietrich, director of the hemophilia rehabilitation project at Orthopaedic Hospital, has been studying 200 hemophiliacs ranging in age from six months to 60 years.

Coexistence With Communists Is Suggested As U.S. Policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three Senate critics of President Johnson's Viet Nam course proposed Saturday that Congress take a hand in trying to orient U.S. policies toward peaceful coexistence with the Communists.

Senator Joseph S. Clark (Dem. Pa.) said public opinion in the United States is turning away from belligerence towards support of a peace offensive in which the United States will take the initiative.

He added: "We may well be closer to a breakthrough for peace than many would think." Senator Wayne Morse (Dem. Ore.) called for "a calculated, sustained, and overt effort to rebuild normal relations" with China.

Senator Clifford P. Case (Rep. N.J.), speaking primarily about the Senate foreign relations committee's role in discussion of Far Eastern policies, proposed a "continuing review of the mainstream of world affairs against which the validity of America's objectives and the rationality of her actions must be assessed."

The three, all members of the Senate foreign relations committee, expressed their views in speeches prepared for separate audiences — Morse at Muhlenberg College, Allentown, Pa., Clark at a Germantown, Pa., Unitarian conference, and Case at a school conference in Hightstown, N.J.

GIVES ANOTHER VIEW
A fourth senator, Democrat John Stennis of Mississippi, expressed the opinion the Communists have drawn a line in Viet Nam to test American determination to contain aggression and will not agree to peace unless they are defeated.

Stennis, who heads the Senate preparedness subcommittee, called for stepped-up military operations against North Viet Nam which he conceded might raise "a very serious question as to whether we will provoke Red China to full intervention in the war."

He predicted a "substantial increase in U.S. forces and called for an end to policy restrictions on North Viet Nam bombing."

The Mississippi Democrat, who accepted the label of "hawk," prepared a speech for the same group addressed by Morse.

Senator Allen J. Ellender (Dem. La.) joined in deploring what Stennis called "endless bombing."

He predicted a "substantial increase in U.S. forces and called for an end to policy restrictions on North Viet Nam bombing."

The Mississippi Democrat, who accepted the label of "hawk," prepared a speech for the same group addressed by Morse.

Senator Allen J. Ellender (Dem. La.) joined in deploring what Stennis called "endless bombing."

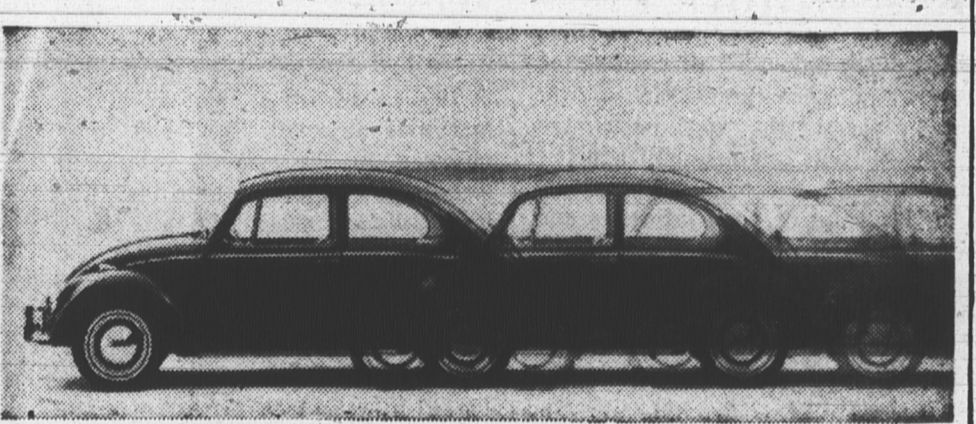
