EXCURSION TO NEW GLASGOW.

A Most Pleasant Outing—Something About New Glasgow and Old Friends There.

The excursion to New Glasgow, promoted by the Sons of England, took place yesterday, and was a distinct success. About 150 ladies and gentlemen participated, and each and every one thoroughly appreciated the outing. The fine new steamship Princess drew out from the wharf at sharp seven, and about four hours later she was docked at Pictou Landing. The run across was very pleasant, and Captain McLean, steward Chandler, purser Gordon and the other officers of the Princess did everything in their power to make those committed to their care enjoy themselves. A more capable or painstaking set of officers it would be hard to find anywhere, and it is not surprising that with such a splendid steamer under their command the Charlottetown-Pictou route is very popular with the travelling public.

Upon arriving at Pictou Landing the excursionists boarded the special in waiting to convey them to New Glasgow, but the train did not move out for about half an hour. This delay lessened the time to be passed in New Glasgow, and as there is little to be seen at the Landing that is of interest the excursionists did not appreciate the enforced wait. However, the railway authorities are wholly responsible as the committee arranged to have the train proceed to New Glasgow immediately upon arrival of the steamer.

On their arrival at New Glasgow the excursionists were met by a large number of people, and were given a hearty welcome. The next hour or so was devoted to supplying the wants of the inner man and woman, after which sight-seeing began. Some drove out to the surrounding country, others visited the steel works, and others again spent the time in and about the city with friends. New Glasgow is one of the most thriving towns in the Maritime Provinces, and its people are active and enterprising. The population is between 4,000 and 5,000, and the peace is preserved by one policeman, who, at some distance, remains one of our own Marshal Cameron. Its streets and sidewalks are well kept, and there are many fine public buildings, handsome private dwellings, and churches of the latest style of architecture. The new High School building, erected at a cost of about \$25,000, is a fine brick structure in every way creditable to the community. New Glasgow also boasts of excellent systems of waterworks and sewerage, and also has electric light and telephone services. Athletic grounds and a public park are the latest acquisitions of this well-ordered and go-ahead little town.

New Glasgow is also well supplied with newspapers, all of which are ably conducted and abreast of the times in respect to what is going on in and about the community in which they are published as well as in other sections of the province and the outside world. The Leader and Enterprise are published by Messrs. Dennis and Douglass, and the Chronicle by Mr. Mackenzie. New Glasgow also boasts of several good hotels. The Vendome is one of the railway stations, with the Northwick near by, and the Windsor a few blocks below. The latter is presided over by Mr. Geo. A. Pyke, a Halifax man who has hosts of friends in Charlottetown. Mr. Pyke has made extensive improvements in the Windsor since obtaining control of that well known hostelry, and its management is first-class in every respect.

There are many people in New Glasgow who are either natives of Prince Edward Island or have spent some years therein and have pleasant recollections of the place. Mr. Richard Maynard, with his estimable wife and family, reside there and they have always a warm corner in their hearts for their Charlottetown friends, and are only too glad to make it as pleasant as possible for those of them who may visit the "Hub" of Nova Scotia. Prof. Smyth, who was for some time organist of St. Peter's Church, Charlottetown, is also located in New Glasgow, and it gave him great pleasure to renew old friendships. Mr. Thomas Smith, who kept a tailor shop in Charlottetown some years ago, also lives there and was glad to see old friends.

The excursionists, after a most pleasant visit, left New Glasgow at half-past three, and half an hour later were on board the Princess at Pictou Landing. After a pleasant run of about four hours the Princess landed its living freight in Charlottetown, all feeling the better of their outing and delighted with every feature of the excursion. Refreshments were provided during the trip by Mr. L. C. Worthy, and patrons of his lunch counter were well pleased.

The Artillery Band accompanied the excursionists, and their excellent playing added much to the enjoyment of the occasion. In New Glasgow they paraded to and from the Windsor, and at the railway station they played some of the latest airs. On the way home as the Princess passed the Marblehead the strains of "Yankee Doodle" rolled out upon the night air, and a few minutes later as the steamer passed the Canadian cutter Acadia the "R. D. White and Blue" was played. The closing item on the musical program was "Home Sweet Home," played by the band as the steamer was coming up to the wharf.

QUEER MANAGEMENT.—A correspondent of the St. John Sun, writing to that paper last week about a visit to P. E. Island, has the following to say: "The Island is looking its very best now, and the stock phrase of the west side poet, 'grand to be seen,' would hardly do justice to one's impression. With beautiful weather, beautiful drives, mackerel fishing, yacht sailing, driving and lots of good food, we find very little to 'kick' at. Noting by the way on the I. C. R. folder, published for the Island branch, that a certain beach on the north side had an hotel, we decided to drive to it on Sunday before dinner hour. We arrived shortly before dinner hour, and when the bell rang, proceeded to the dining room after some others and took seats, which a gentleman said were not reserved. While conversing with the gentleman, a waiter appeared and requested our retirement as the permanent guests had to be supplied first. 'In about an hour we could get our dinner.' We retired in good order. A few minutes later another St. John man and a friend entered and took the same seats. Well, they were routed, and later on we heard one of them asking for the landlord, who was evidently in the kitchen behind a carving knife—a safe place. To cut a long story short, the others waited the time specified and went in to the second table. Although we waited and felt hungry enough, we did not re-enter, but drove back to the Davies house, fourteen miles, where one is treated like a human being and dined. We told the landlord of the beach hotel that while it was quite right, perhaps, to favor permanent guests, and perhaps all at once might have been too many, it was not good judgment to allow anyone to take seats at a dining table and request their withdrawal, particularly a lady. We venture to express the hope that there is not more than one place on the Island where such treatment would be accorded a visitor. It is a case of bad management and likely to do harm to other hotels on the North Side where the treatment is all that can be desired. Although the writer does not specify the exact place at which this occurred he says that the extreme end of the Brackley Point road has no charm for him. In another part of his letter he speaks highly of the hospitality of the people of the Island.
