

Prince of Wales College and Normal School.

The annual examination of the classes in the Prince of Wales College and Normal School took place to-day, before a larger audience than usual. A new feature was the reading of a valedictory by one of the senior students, which was well written, well delivered, and contained many valuable suggestions. Dr. Anderson, in his address, remarked that the prize-winners this year were fully up to the standard of previous years, and that the whole year's work was, perhaps, as gratifying as that of any preceding one. He further said that Senator Haythorne's increased generosity enabled him fittingly to reward some of his best students. The prize for Agricultural Chemistry, given by R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., was, he said, keenly competed for; and in closing his short but practical address, he desired the students ever to bear in mind that, no matter how great their intellectual attainments might be, without moral worth his work and their future would be alike useless.

Another Massacre.

NEW YORK, May 24. A special from Durango, Mexico, gives details of a remarkable massacre in Estancia. Mr. Muller, Mrs. Muller, a school teacher and an infant child of Muller's occupied a hacienda near San Miguel de Megueta, and while at supper on Monday were attacked by robbers. Muller was shot to death and the teacher knocked senseless. The robbers finished the supper, but while they were at the table, the school-teacher escaped. Mrs. Muller was forced to show where all the valuables were kept and was treated brutally besides. Just as the robbers were departing, a party of soldiers arrived on the ground. After a hot pursuit seven of the bandits were captured. As ordinary trials are long, cost money, and are not always either profitable or satisfactory, these seven prisoners were given a short way to justice by Ley de Fuego. That is, they were allowed to try to escape, and in this effort for freedom were all shot dead. In Mexico when any prisoner tries to escape an officer has the right to kill him on the spot. The officers and soldiers are in full pursuit of the others engaged in this robbery and it is expected they will capture and kill them.

Off to England.

OTTAWA, May 23. Lord Lansdowne and suite left for England to-day.

QUEBEC, May 24. Lord and Lady Lansdowne arrived here at an early hour this morning. At 9 o'clock, escorted by the Queen's Own Canadian Hussars, they drove to Queen's wharf, where farewell addresses from the City Council and Board of Trade were presented to them. The members of the Local Government attended in a body, with the exception of Mr. Mercier, who left an autograph letter explaining his absence. At 10 o'clock the party were conveyed to the steamship Parisian, which immediately steamed out of the harbor amid the hearty cheers of an immense crowd, and roar of vice-regal salute from the citadel.

English Elections.

LONDON, May 23. In the parliamentary election at Southampton to-day, Evans (Liberal) received 5,151 votes, and Guest 4,266. The vacancy was caused by the promotion of Admiral Sir John E. Commerell (Conservative) to a command at Portsmouth.

LONDON, May 24. The Pall Mall Gazette says the defeat of the Conservative candidate at Southampton was the worst shock the Government has received this season.

The Star says the Government's defeat was the beginning of the end, and means the triumph of the Home Rule cause through the break up of the Liberal-Unionist party.

A Desperate Encounter.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 24. Chinese advices give details of the wholesale raid by a swarm of pirates upon the steamer San Pablo, which went on a reef and was wrecked in Formosa Straits. The crew and passengers fought the robbers desperately and finally drove them off by playing hot water upon them. Many of the coolies were drowned in the encounter. The passengers and crew then made their escape in small boats, carrying with them mails and specie. The pirates returned to the steamer and stripped and burned her. The San Pablo was valued at \$500,000.

A Big Blaze.

KINGSTON, ONT., May 24. At Selby, Lennox Co., fire crackers to-day caused the destruction of two churches, a hotel and outbuildings, several residences and a carriage factory involving a loss of \$18,000.

More Bishops.

NEW YORK, May 25. The general Methodist Conference to-day elected Dr. J. P. Newman and Dr. Goodsell, Bishops.

CABINET CHANGES.—Advices from Ottawa state that Hon. Geo. E. Foster has been appointed Minister of Finance vice Sir Charles Tupper, who has resigned his seat in Parliament, preparatory to leaving for London to resume his duties as High Commissioner for Canada.

SPOKEN.—Capt. Ledwell, of the Erema, spoke in lat. 44.30, lon. 58.50, the fishing schooner Ellen A. Swain, of Provincetown, Mass., and the captain of the latter said it was their intention to remove to the Grand Banks, as they were meeting with poor success where they were.

THE JUBILEE SURPLUS.—We learn that the Queen's Jubilee Committee are moving in the matter of holding a meeting for the purpose of disposing of their \$200 surplus—the condition on which this money was appropriated to the Park roadway, not having been complied with.
