**LOSS BY FROST.**

**Crops—Fatal Quarrel—Flour.**

MONTREAL, June 28, 1877.

A company in Toronto has gone into liquidation in consequence of a loss of sixty thousand dollars by the St. John fire. Not a large concern!

**VIGILANCE COMMITTEES WANTED.**

Editor of Daily Examiner:

Sir,—That incendiaries are at work in Portland and St. John there can be no longer any doubt; and that the late fire has brought into that city and into the neighboring Provinces a large number of ruffian plunderers is also an ascertained fact.

Few cities stand an easier prey, as well to the devouring element as to the operations of these plunderers, as our own; yet our citizens seem to sleep in fancied security. On Sunday last, immediately after the alarm of fire, with the ready consent of the Council I appointed ten special constables to assist the police; picked men selected by the Captains of the different Fire Companies. But they cannot long endure constant night patrol. The police, though all on duty, with only such leave as is absolutely necessary, are, however willing, unable much longer to stand this extra work; and we must shortly return to the usual police patrol, which is wholly inadequate for the protection of the city.

The immediate organization of our citizens into Vigilance Committees I look upon as a necessity; unless indeed we prefer to leave our lives and our properties entirely at the mercy of these marauders. I know of no means so effectual. The knowledge of this organization will of itself, perhaps, prevent their coming.
