BIG PRIZES FOR STAMPS.—According to an exchange a block of four Mauritius two-cent postage stamps brought \$1,650 recently in London, the highest price at which a set of stamps has ever been sold at auction. A Swiss 4 centime brought \$150; Wurttemberg 2 kreuzer, pink, \$100; Nova Scotia 1 cent, violet, \$25; Mauritius 1 penny post-paid, pair, \$142; 2 penny (early state), \$145; Canada 6 penny, purple, imperfect, \$67; New Brunswick 1 cent, mauve, \$130.

SHIPPING NEWS.—The schr. Gowan Gem cleared today for St. John's Nfld., with a cargo which included 600 bushels potatoes, 50 bushels turnips and 10 of parsnips. The schr. cleared, taking 1650 bushels potatoes, 1000 bushels oats, and several barrels of carrots, parsnips and oatmeal. The schr. Leah arrived today with a cargo of coal, and the General Middleton with lumber and also two tons hay, 200 barrels potatoes and 90 bushels turnips.

ASSAULT CASE.—An assault case, the scene of which is laid at Southport, will be tried in one of the County Magistrate's courts on Wednesday next. According to reports, George A. Kay, of that place, and his wife have not been getting along very agreeably of late. A few days ago Mrs. Kay's brother, a man named Hedy Horse, who lives at Rustico, called at Kay's house, and he and Kay, who the story goes, had some words, the upshot of which was that Kay struck Horse on the head with a blunt instrument, causing injuries which had to be dressed by Dr. Dewar.
