Alex B. Campbell Assesses Program

"There is a stern challenge to everyone in the swiftly changing times in which we live," declared Alex B. Campbell in assessing the progress of the current provincial election campaign, as he and his new Liberals move into high gear in their all-out effort to win the May 30 electoral race. He was addressing a public meeting at Malpeque on behalf of Leon Arsenault and W.M. Burns, Liberal candidates for 3rd Prince.

Commencing tonight at Hunter River Mr. Campbell will be speaking at public meetings in all parts of the province nightly until the end of the campaign. "To keep abreast of these changing times," Mr. Campbell said, "people have to be alert, bold and competent in every walk and endeavour of life. We cannot stand still while others are moving ahead scientifically, agriculturally, industrially, professionally in business and in all the trades. If we fail to maintain the pace or help to set it, we quickly will fall behind in the race for greater accomplishment. It is not good enough merely to place or show in this hectic day and age. To gain real advancement, all of us must be out to win."

THIS CHALLENGE Mr. Campbell said that he felt this challenge of change was particularly applicable to the present political situation. With regard to housing, Mr. Campbell said that he felt farmers and fishermen, should be given the same fair terms as higher income groups in urban areas to obtain good low-cost homes through Central Mortgage financing and any further provincial help required. "These people are the backbone of our economy," he said, "and are entitled to the same treatment urban dwellers obtain."

Dealing with the "far-reaching" agricultural program of the Liberals, he charged he felt there was a much greater potential in specialty crops, including flax, than had so far been professed.

Industrial expansion, Mr. Campbell said, had been largely confined to a few areas. The Liberals would go all out to assist industrial development "by Islanders for Islanders instead mainly of giving gigantic guar-

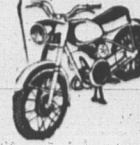

Each school presented the play which they performed at the regional competitions. Each were one act plays. Speaking as the director of the Playwrights Workshop, Ha-

She said that she would like to have seen plays written by dramatists who are writing now.
