Drawing to a Close.

EVIDENCE FOR THE DEFENCE.

St. John, Dec. 19.

The cross-examination of the expert, Mr. Sawyer, was continued all this morning in the McDonald case by C. W. Waldon.

The examination was most complete, but failed to change Sawyer's mind in the least regarding the similarity between McDonald's writing and the addresses on the boxes.

He said he first examined the addresses on the boxes, and samples of McDonald's writing, and that the opinions then formed were more than confirmed with additional pieces of writing.

Ottawa News.

Ottawa, Dec. 19.

The Government will call for tenders in a few days for a steam service in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, between Magdalen Islands and some point on the mainland not yet settled upon.

Reports received by the Comptroller of the Northwest Mounted Police as to the condition of affairs in the force throughout the Northwest, are of the most satisfactory nature.

The fact that the Dominion Government are sending to England for an officer to fill the position of aid-de-camp to General Middleton, instead of appointing a Military College graduate to the place, is unfavorable commented upon here.

Messrs. Andrew Allan, of the Allan Line, and H. Bulmer, of Montreal, had another interview with the Minister of Marine and Fisheries yesterday regarding the proposed survey and tidal observations of the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Last evening J. X. Perrault, who represented the Chamber of Commerce at the Paris Exposition, presented to representatives of the Massey Manufacturing Co. a gold medal, awarded to that Company for its exhibits of agricultural implements.

The track in the Canadian Pacific Railway extension from London to Windsor is now completed and will shortly be in running order. The line is one hundred and twelve miles in length.

Captain Kenny's Tyote, an Englishman who has been a short time in Canada, has been appointed to an Indian agency in the Northwest, at a salary of about \$2000 a year.

The Order Countermanded.

London, Dec. 19.

The Admiralty, as a measure of precaution in view of the possible straining of the relations between England and Portugal, regarding their possessions in Africa, has made arrangements to transfer the depots and naval stores for the Mediterranean and channel squadrons from Lisbon and orders were recently issued for the warship Agamemnon, now at Zanzibar, to rejoin the Mediterranean squadron.

Landlords' Convention.

Dublin, Dec. 19.

The Duke of Abercorn presided at the Landlords' Convention in this city to-day. He denied that the combination of landlords was intended to hamper the tenants, and said that not a sixpence of the convention's funds had gone for such a purpose.

Electric Light Wires.

New York, Dec. 19.

The work of cutting down dangerous electric light wires in various parts of the city still continues and there is no prospect of the city emerging from the gloom that prevails at night.
