LEAVES DISAPPEAR AS CATERPILLARS MUNCH From the Manitoba border to half way across Ontario, billions of caterpillars are munching their way through forests, leaving leafless, lifeless stalks. They have stalled trains at Little Current, invaded homes in Muskoka. Blow-torches, flame throwers and DDT are being used against them.
