THE DAIRYMEN'S MEETING.

Sir,—Being a delegate to the dairymen's convention, I have watched with interest the discussion following the unfortunate incident of that evening. Most of the discussion has been wide of the mark. Whose meeting was it, the dairymen's or Mr. Farquharson's? To my mind it was the dairymen's meeting, and not that of any political boss. We must give Mr. Farquharson credit for the interest he took in the matter; but his statement that he had gone to great expense hiring a hall and train, and that therefore the time of the meeting should not be taken by Mr. Dillon was certainly very strange. The delegates paid the usual half-fare on the railway given to all kinds of conventions and therefore Mr. Farquharson was under no expense in that way. The hall rent he paid; but surely his paying the hall rent did not entitle him to call down any man the delegates called to address them. Mr. Dillon may have, in the judgment of many, been putting the necessity of an inspector and the capability to Mr. Spillet very strongly; but surely the 120 intelligent delegates who were listening without a single murmur of disapproval should be allowed to have their speaker finish his remarks without the snappy, bossy dictation of any one.

Again, probably Mr. Dillon had a very just reason to feel anxious that a competent man should be appointed. The season before last we had a man named Woodford for inspector, and wherever he learned his cheese-making he certainly did not make the kind of cheese the buyers wanted, and there is not a competent cheesemaker in the province but disapproved of his methods, so far as I could learn. I had it from himself that we must have dry cheese, and every pound he made in our factory took at least eleven pounds of milk to make it, which resolved a straight loss to our patrons of about 5 cents per hundred of their milk. Mr. Spillet's make of cheese evidently meets the buyer's views, for his make took the top price for last season and he made the lb of cheese from 10.33 lb of milk, and from milk testing 3.57 on an average.

In short, an inspector or instructor that will help the cheesemakers make the kind of cheese buyers want and from the smallest possible quantity of milk would be worth thousands of dollars to our patrons, whilst an incompetent instructor might occasion them large losses.

That Mr. Dillon felt and spoke very strongly on that point is not to be surprised at, and if he did take up some time it was on an important matter and one he had, if any man had a perfect right to speak out on. Why Mr. Farquharson should have adopted a plan to have him shorten his remarks that should humiliate Mr. Dillon before that large audience is difficult to understand. I shall attribute no improper motive to the Premier. But the question is hard to down: would he have snubbed Mr. Dillon if he were a liberal?

Mr. Dillon stands in the highest estimation of every dairyman in the Province. He is our largest buyer in cheese and butter, and did the Guardian which opens its columns to writers such as "Anti-Humbler" to insinuate double-dealing to him, ever hear of him doing or being in any shady business? Mr. Dillon has assisted every man or factory that he had to do with, even although dismissed from the public service. He went to England at his own expense and returned with information of great value to the Province, information that he could make money by and keep it to himself. But he has not done so. Yet a would-be religious journal, would open its columns to a correspondent to injure his business reputation wherever it is read.

In conclusion I would say, I appreciate Mr. Farquharson's efforts in getting up these meetings. But has made his mistakes too! His calling on the people to support Mr. Fisher because he sent Prof. Robertson here, which I heard him do at one meeting, was too thin. Yet no one snubbed him as he snubbed Mr. Dillon. DELEGATE.

BLUE BOOK ON CHINA

Has Been Issued by the British Government.

LONDON, March 15.—The British foreign office has issued China a bluebook covering the history of recent events in the far east.

The whole tenor of the book shows a desire to meet the views of the United States and Germany.

MONTAGUE LITERARY SOCIETY.

On the evening of the 6th inst., the members of this society were treated to a masterpiece. It was Mr. Peterson's lecture on "Negro Slavery in the South." Including the lecture proper and the discussion of many questions asked, Mr. Peterson held the closest attention of his audience for two hours. He is a gentleman peculiarly capable of delivering a lecture on that subject, having been born in North Carolina, and having lived there and visited the various States and their plantations for 21 years.

At the outset the lecturer spoke of the existence of slavery to some degree in different periods of the world's history, taking some examples from Biblical writings. He then drew the attention of his hearers to the conditions which led up to slavery in America. He noted that those races were brought from Congo and other African districts where there in their natural home and element they had existed as slaves, that they were then sold to the masters of Southern plantations for prices varying from \$500 to \$1000 each. He showed that in their condition of slavery they were well provided and cared for—they had no thought for the morrow—their money value would insure such care. He pointed out the fact that those slaves were ever happy and displayed that happiness by many signs while at work on the plantations, and never agitated for freedom; not only so but when their freedom became a reality many of them could not fall happily into their new surroundings nor rejoice in their liberty. This was not to be wondered at. Hitherto they were merely passive animals, their very existence determined by other minds. Now they were suddenly thrown on their own resources, and to think and work out their own salvation was a grave and serious problem. The lecturer demonstrated also the blessings, it might be in disguise, that slavery in America accomplished for that lowly race. They were brought from a dark ignorant country and placed under the influences of civilization. They were brought from darkness to light, with the civilizing and christianizing results.

But the war is over, and the negroes are free. There is now an opportunity afforded them to develop what latent powers they may possess. The principle of slavery is wrong, although in a darker age it was considered right by both church and state. The clergyman employed slaves, the laymen employed slaves, but both classes looked upon the matter in the same right. At length intelligence and common sense succeeded in establishing in the land of the free a better condition of things. J. R. M.
