A Complaint.

SIR.—Several merchants and shippers complain that there is an inexcusable delay of perishable freight, such as fresh fish, in Charlottetown. Such freight, when prepaid, as it generally is, should be forwarded as quickly as possible. Parties who shipped, and expected that their goods were at their destination, found them in Charlottetown two days after the boat had left. This is a matter of much importance to the public, and should not be lost sight of by those entrusted with the care of people's property. MERCHANT. [Mr. Lord, the agent of the Department here, informs us that the only instance in which the shipment of fresh fish was delayed was when fish was brought in by teams from Rust co, for which the necessary shipping papers were not made out. These fish were placed in the warehouse pending the making out of the papers required. Several days elapsed before these papers were ready. Then the fish was at once forwarded to their destination. The railway authorities were instructed to have all perishable freight for the Stanley coming by the morning train forwarded at once to the steamer in order that it might be promptly shipped. When this was done the freight was in every instance forwarded on the day upon which it was received, as perishable goods always had the preference in shipping.]
