This shattered the world mark of 4:15.9 set by Jon Konrads of Australia in 1960 and the Games mark of 4:20 set in 1962 at Perth by Murray Rose, another Australian.

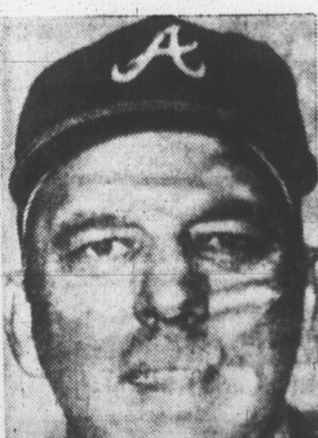
# Riders, Stampeders Seen Most Explosive
