Rev. S. Adolphus MacAuley was ordained to the holy priesthood yesterday morning by His Excellency, Bishop James Boyle, in St. Mary's Church, Souris. Over 1,000 people witnessed the ordination. His Excellency celebrated Mass assisted by Rev. Eric Robin and Rev. P. A. Murnaghan. Rev. Patrick MacMahon, D.D., was master of ceremonies and Rev. P. F. MacDonald, assistant master of ceremonies.

Right Rev. R. V. MacKenzie, Rector of St. Dunstan's College, preached the sermon. Father MacAuley was assisted during the ceremony by Rev. J. P. E. O'Hanley.

Present in the sanctuary were Right Rev. J. A. Murphy, Rev. R. J. MacDonald, Rev. George MacDonald, Rev. W. A. Keefe, Rev. L. J. Ayers, Rev. H. J. Croken and Rev. Bennett MacDonald.

The altar was beautifully decorated with colored lights and flowers. The choir was under the direction of Sister St. George of St. Mary's Convent.

After the Mass Father MacAuley gave his individual blessing to his parents and relatives. At 3:30 in the afternoon he officiated at Benediction and at the conclusion gave his blessing to all present.

Father MacAuley is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank MacAuley. He studied theology at Kendrick Seminary, St. Louis, Oklahoma, after graduating from St. Dunstan's College in 1947. He is the first native of St. Mary's Parish to be ordained in Souris.

Teachers Hold Study Meeting

The teachers of Montague, Georgetown, Murray River and surrounding districts assembled on Friday afternoon for the second study group meeting held this year at Montague High School, at which questions pertaining to the teaching profession were discussed by the supervisors, Mr. H. J. Hynes, Mr. Willard Brehaut, and the teachers.

Mr. Leslie Stewart capably acted as chairman. There were forty-two teachers present. The first discussion centered around the grading and promotion of pupils. It was pointed out that student failure was subject to many causes, the main one being lack of sufficient study and knowledge, and it was felt that such a student should remain in an unpassed grade another year. Mr. Brehaut discussed the new grade eight papers, showing the new set-up which, he stated, were an improvement over the former type. Mr. Hynes commented on these examinations, showing the teachers how a set of examinations should be set up.

fer adverse effects from this constant changing of teachers, each of whom have a different method of presenting problems, and their solution. The answer to the problem lay in permanency of position, so that the students would become accustomed to the teachers methods, and would thereby benefit. Other topics discussed included, annual reports and statistical returns, improving school property, the use of dark green boards, desks and chairs, lighting in the classroom, and curricular changes. In this last discussion it was shown that poor readers on the whole learn with difficulty, and at present each grade had a large percentage of poor readers who, as a result, were slow in learning and preparing the prescribed school work. At the conclusion of the meeting, Mr. Hynes expressed his appreciation to the teachers for their attendance. The meeting then adjourned.
