## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### The Opposition Councillors.

SIR.—People are still inquiring about  
our Opposition "Legislative" Councillors,  
and especially about one or two of their  
number. Every one knows how faithfully,  
during the late session, they obeyed the  
outside bosses. They opposed the efforts  
of the Government trying to bring about  
retrenchment. Their Honors believe in  
high taxation. Not only this, but they  
appear bound to get their friends  
in power so that they can take a  
hand in piling on the taxes. They style  
themselves Liberals. How very liberal  
they are. They could talk anti-subway and  
anti-retrenchment by the hour, but they  
couldn't find time to say a word on the Irish  
Coercion Bill. Oh no, that is a subject  
that would grate harshly on their Honors'  
ears. Hence the Irish resolutions, it is  
said, were placed in the capacious coat  
pocket of His Honor from Souris for safe  
keeping. But this will not do. Many  
want to hear from Mr. Kickham, especially  
some of his disgusted constituents.

### Principal Grant

At the Canadian Club (May 6) Principal  
Grant, of Queen's University, Kingston,  
Ont., lectured on the subject of "Canada  
First." A very large audience was present  
and great enthusiasm prevailed. The  
lecturer, among other things, said that he  
trusted the proposed temporary adjust-  
ment on the fishery troubles, as suggested  
by Lord Salisbury, with the full consent of  
Canada, would be adopted so that during  
the next few months opportunity might be  
afforded for a calm and deliberate decision  
of the whole of the relations existing be-  
tween the two countries. With regard to  
unrestricted commercial intercourse be-  
tween the two countries, the Rev. Principal  
said that it is, as every other question, must  
be looked upon from the standpoint of  
Canada first, the question being: Would it  
be of permanent and material benefit? On  
the point of material advantage, the Prin-  
cipal said that he could not be considered  
an authority, and would not like to express  
an opinion, but it seemed manifest that  
such unrestricted intercourse must be of  
unspeakable benefit to both sides. At the  
close of the lecture there was an enthusias-  
tic scene in which motions of thanks were  
made and seconded by Rev. Dr. Ormiston,  
Rev. Dr. McArthur, Rev. Mr. Fothergill  
and Monsignor Ducey, representing the  
Presbyterian, Baptist, Episcopal and Roman  
Catholic Churches.

### A Nova Scotian Murdered in Colorado.

A letter received by the Halifax *Chronicle*  
from Glenwood Springs, Colorado, conveys  
intelligence of the murder there recently of  
a Nova Scotian named B. F. Grant. The  
correspondent sending the news is Mr. J.  
J. Bender, who writes: "I enclose you a  
letter from a Mr. J. A. Moore addressed to  
Mr. B. F. Grant, who met an untimely  
death at the hands of some desperadoes,  
who are now in prison. He was tending  
bar at the Corder hotel at the time, and  
got on a little spree. Some of his friends  
think he had considerable money about  
him, and the public opinion is that he was  
murdered for the purpose of securing the  
amount. He was well taken care of, and  
everything provided and done for him by  
a Mrs. Bender, who cared for him like a  
mother, but under the influence of liquor,  
he was taken from her care, and within five  
or six hours was a dead man. It is said  
that James Goodwin was the murderer of  
Grant. He was killed here at 7 on the  
evening of April 11th. I think his relatives  
are in Hants or Colchester county,  
and if you can find them out his remains  
are subject to their order. The body has  
been respectfully buried, and all his effects  
are in custody of Mrs. Bender, awaiting the  
direction of his friends."

### A New Catholic Church.

The *Moncton Times* says that the Roman  
Catholic Church in that town has for a long  
time been unequal to the accommodation  
of the increasing congregation, and pastor  
and people have for several years past been  
working with a view to the erection of a  
larger and more suitable edifice, which  
will be commenced this year. According  
to the plans recently secured from G. Er-  
nest Fairweather, of St. John, the new  
edifice will be a handsome structure, Gothic  
in style, and will have a seating capacity  
for about 1,000 people. The extreme  
length of the building is 130 feet, width,  
60, with nave 32 feet. The Sunday school  
rooms in the basement will be 69 by 60  
feet with ceiling 12 feet. The rest of the  
basement will contain winter chapel, vestry  
and furnace rooms. The Sunday school  
rooms are especially large and commodious.  
The interior style of the church will be  
Gothic. The contract for which tenders  
are now asked embrace the basement and  
the walls of the main edifice. The material  
to be used is freestone, rock face, and  
the edifice complete is expected to cost in  
the vicinity of \$50,000.

The marriage of Carnegie, the Pittsburg  
millionaire, is worth special mention. He  
has not been in a hurry to take to himself  
a wife. He has first made his pile and then  
gone in for matrimony. No doubt he will  
take his bride to Dunfermline, in his native  
Scotland, and astonish the lieges of that  
ancient city with the gorgeous display of  
the poor boy that left with scarcely a shoe  
on his foot some forty years ago. All honor  
to the plucky little Scot. He had every-  
thing against him. But he manfully  
wrestled with his difficulties, and now at  
the age of fifty-two he presents his bride  
with a home worth \$250,000, and as a  
slight token of affectionate regard, gives  
her besides, half a million of dollars in U.  
S. Bonds.

## The Northwest Indians.

A Winnipeg despatch says four Blood  
Indians, suspected of firing upon mounted  
police-men recently, have been arrested and  
taken to Lethbridge where they await iden-  
tification. A Fort MacLeod despatch says:  
"Inspector Lander and thirty men went  
to the Blood reserve yesterday to arrest  
seven Indians supposed to have fired on the  
mounted police and testamers recently,  
but the Indians could not be found. The  
chief volunteered to assist to make arrests  
and accompanied the police." The annual  
spring scare has about fizzled out. Lieuten-  
ant-Governor Dewdney on being inter-  
viewed at Regina said that some young  
Blood Indians with some of the South  
Prorgans were probably of their reserve as  
usual in the spring and that one of the  
horse stealing expeditions might have fired  
off three guns as a warning not to approach  
nearer, but not for the purpose of killing  
any one. There was not the slightest  
occasion for alarm. Yankton, an Indian,  
was maliciously shot and killed on Friday  
night on the reserve seven miles from  
Deloraine in Southern Manitoba by another  
Indian named John Stulhorst. The shoot-  
ing was the result of an old feud between  
the two Indians.

### A Murder in New Westminster.

A MAN STABBED IN ELEVEN PLACES AND DIES  
ALMOST IMMEDIATELY.

Between 9 and 10 a. m. May 6, J. E. Muir  
was murdered on the railway wharf in New  
Westminster, by a man named Wm. Shearer.  
The cause of the trouble between the men is  
supposed to be a long standing one. Shearer,  
who was discharging lumber from a scow,  
deliberately walked upon the wharf to where  
Muir was standing, and, without any words,  
stabbed him repeatedly. On Muir attempting  
to get away, he was caught by the coat  
collar, and forcibly held until the murder was  
accomplished. The murderer then threw his  
knife into the water and quietly gave himself  
up. Muir died in a few minutes, and on  
examination eleven stabs were found on the  
body between the neck and lower parts of the  
body.
