## Latest Storm Dumps 6-In. Snow, Fills Roads

A storm which dumped nearly six inches of snow on the province by 8 p.m. had highway traffic slowed to a near standstill in the province last night.

The snow was accompanied by east to north winds of 25 gusting to 35, which made for poor visibility and drifting.

Plows were being kept on emergency standby, and were expected to swing into action early this morning.

Five inches of snow fell in Prince County from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. and was expected to continue during the night.

A weather report from RCAF Station Summerside, indicated snow flurries would continue all day today with 30 mile per hour winds increasing to 50.

Roads leading from Summerside were passable up to 10 p.m. All Eastern Provincial Airways flights were reported on schedule.

**MIGHT BLOCK**

Western Prince reported intermittent snow, becoming heavy at times. It was thought roads would become blocked in cuttings if drifting increased.

The weather picture was similar in the rest of the Maritimes, with snow accumulations in Nova Scotia reaching as high as 6.4 inches at Halifax International Airport. Two flights were

cloudy, and precipitation had tapered off to snowflurries.

A storm situated 200 miles southeast of Cape Breton is continuing to move northeastward into the orcheasiern part of the district is expected to let up before dawn leaving the Maritimes under cloudy skies with occasional snowflurries today.

Strong northerly winds are forecast for all regions and in some localities gusts to 50 miles per hour will occur.

**Regional forecasts:** South Shore, Annapolis Valley: Cloudy with occasional flurries; mild turning colder in afternoon; northerly winds 30 with gusts to 45. Early morning and mid-afternoon temperatures at Halifax and Yarmouth 24 and 30, Kentville 22 and 18.

**Outlook for Sunday** - Sunny and extremely cold.

**Northern N.S., Eastern Shore, Prince Edward Island:** Cloudy with snowflurries; very mild turning colder this afternoon; northerly winds 30 with gusts to 50. Early morning and mid afternoon temperatures at New Glasgow, Goshen and Charlottetown 22 and 18.

## Mount Stewart Resident Dies In City Hosp.

A long-time resident of Mt. Stewart, Daniel I. MacDougald, died Friday morning in the Charlottetown Hospital after a short illness. He was in his 78th year.

Born at Blooming Point, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Roderick MacDougald, he was educated at Prince of Wales College and taught school in the province for several years before moving to Mt. Stewart to enter the business of the late H. F. Feehan. He resided at Mt. Stewart after his retirement, up until the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife, the former Winifred Jay, one daughter and two sons, Lottie, Mrs. Oral Peacock, Brighton, and Carl, all of Charlottetown. Also surviving are one sister, Mrs. W. F. MacDonald, Tracadie Cross, and one brother, John, of Charlottetown.

His remains are resting at the Charlottetown Funeral Home, from where the funeral will be held Monday morning at 8.30, with Requiem High Mass at Mt. Stewart at 9.30 a.m.

## Fishermen's Ass'n Plan Given Study

**TIGNISH** - Fifty fishermen representing Alberton, Tignish, Minnedosa, Tignish Shore, Ebbesfleet and Skippers Pond attended a meeting in Myricks store yesterday afternoon with the hope of setting up a Prince County Fishermen's Association.

Urban LeBlanc, extension department of St. Dunstan's University, presented proposals on the setting up of such an organization. Mr. LeBlanc stated that the province has been divided into five zones for the purpose of setting up local associations.

Two local associations in zone three and four are in the early stages of organization, he said, while zones one and two have been organized under the Southern Kings Fishermen's Association and Eastern Kings Fishermen's Association respectively.

Fishermen in zone five had divided opinion on the matter and due to a lack of full attendance from all areas the meeting adjourned to study the issue and meet at a later date.

The federal fisheries department was represented by Hubert Cheverie, and Harvey Hutt of Alberton chaired the meeting. Alyre Wedge was acting secretary.

Zone five takes in Portage West on both sides of the island.

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## Former Mayor, MLA Dies In Georgetown

**GEORGETOWN** - John Howard MacDonald, former mayor of this town, died suddenly last night. He was in his 85th year.

He apparently had been in good health up to the time of his sudden passing. He walked across the street from his home about 6.30 p.m. to the office of Dr. A. Kennedy, where he suffered a heart attack and where he died shortly afterward.

Born in Georgetown, the son of the late Archibald J. MacDonald and his late wife, the former Marion Murphy, he resided all his life here with the exception of a period spent attending St. Francis Xavier University at Antigonish, N.S. in 1900 and three years spent in Winnipeg, Man., in the early 1900s.

In 1908 he entered the family business in Georgetown, which consisted of a large general store, export business and lobster cannery. He retired from commercial life in the 1930s. He served in the Prince Edward Island Legislature for two terms, 1923-1927 and 1931-1935, representing Fifth Kings as a member of the Conservative Party and a running mate of the late Premier J. D. Stewart.

From 1924 to 1925 and from 1929 to 1932 he held the office of mayor of this town.

At one time he was president of Eastern Canneries Ltd. and president of the Georgetown Silver Black Fox Co. He also gave of his services as a member of the board of trustees of the Georgetown Community Welfare League and was one of those instrumental in building the Georgetown rink.

**ACTIVE INTEREST**

Right up to the time of his passing he maintained an active interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the town. He was an exceptionally active man, both physically and mentally and could recount with detail events and personalities he had encountered during his active and eventful lifetime.

He was an avid reader and student of nature and possessed an optimistic and Christian outlook on life which could not but influence for good all those whose privilege it was to have known him.

He is survived by his widow, the former Jeanette King of Georgetown and one son, Donald, of Toronto. Also surviving are three sisters, Marjorie, Mrs. H. F. R. Watts, formerly of Boston, Mass., and now of Georgetown; Catherine, Mrs. H. D. MacInerney, Saint John, N.B.; and Gladys, Georgetown. Three brothers, Temple, Glen and Allister predeceased him.

Funeral arrangements had not been completed last night.

## Suspended License Case Adjudged

Judson Everett Meyers, Mt. Albion, charged with driving a motor vehicle while his license was suspended had his case adjudged until March 8 for trial.

The accused, not present in court, was represented by John Holmes when the case came up before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday afternoon.

Also not present in court was George Henry Thorne, he too, is from Mt. Albion. Mr. Thorne is charged with passing another vehicle without signalling his intent to do so. He was represented by Gordon Tweedy and his case was adjudged until Feb. 24.

George Louis Joseph, 39 Pownal Street, charged with break entry and theft, yesterday elected trial by magistrate without a jury and pleaded not guilty to the charge. John P. Nicholson acted as counsel for the accused. He was remanded until Feb. 26, bail to stand.

## Local Holsteins Still Maintain Top Can. Records

Two cows bred and developed in the Abegweit herd of the late Senator J. Walter Jones - it is owned now by B.B. (Bus) Jones - still hold top position on the honor roll of Canadian champion Holstein producers.

Abegweit Stardust established in 1964 a production record of 26,172 pounds milk, 1,317 pounds butter fat in the mature class, 305-day division that is still the second highest on the honor roll in the class.

Abegweit Milady established in 1965 a production record that was a world mark at the time and still tops the list among Canadian Holsteins in the 305-day division on three-times-a-day milking as a junior four-year-old with 24,939 pounds milk, 1,066 pounds fat. (The world record was for butterfat production.)

Milady had established a world record as well in fat production as a junior three-year-old the previous year, with 19,743 pounds milk, 816 pounds fat in the 305-day division.

**WINNIPEG (CP)** - The Hudson's Bay Company reports its rent-a-canoe project, initiated in 1964, was so successful it is considering expanding its available fleet from the present 28 canoes. The company made the canoes available in northwestern Canada, where qualified paddlers and woodsmen could rent them for \$25 a week to travel from one HBC post to another.

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## Ice Conditions Deteriorating Daily In Strait

Heavy ice conditions in Northumberland Strait were slowing ferry travel on the Borden-Tormentine run yesterday.

Provincial transportation director B. Graham Rogers, describing ice conditions as the worst since 1961, said the situation seems to be deteriorating daily.

The Canadian National Railway's dispatcher said the MV Abegweit was experiencing her main difficulties near the Tormentine end.

The Abegweit was unable to make her usual early-morning trip because of ice which moved into the strait in the last few days.

She took two hours, 20 minutes, to make the nine-mile crossing with the passenger train yesterday morning, and 10 minutes longer to make a trip later in the day.

The evening train crossing, however, was only slightly behind schedule.

**SHERBROOKE CARD PARTY**


