Archaeologists Report 4,700-year-old Sarcophagus To Be Opened Shortly

SAKKARA, Egypt, (Reuters)—Egyptian archaeologists reported Tuesday they are almost ready to open a recently-discovered sarcophagus which they believe holds the body of a pharaoh buried 4,700 years ago with a vast fortune in golden funeral ornaments.

The tomb will be opened in the next few days. After the contents are examined and the ancient king identified work at the site will end for this season because of the intense heat.

The gleaming alabaster sarcophagus is in a burial chamber beneath an unfinished pyramid.

EQUIPMENT READY

Dr. Zakariah Goseim, 40-year-old Egyptologist, discovered the pyramid in 1951, buried in the sand here at Sakkara, "city of the dead" 15 miles southeast of Cairo.

Chemists from Cairo museum visited the underground chamber Tuesday, bringing materials they will need when the sarcophagus is opened.

Goseim said "already we have assembled the block and tackle with which we will remove the frontal panel, giving access to secrets within the sarcophagus."

In a temporary museum, Goseim displayed 21 golden bracelets of varying sizes and a small golden powder box shaped like two joined shells. He discovered these in a long passageway leading to the burial chamber.

"The fact that they were found there shows that robbers could not have entered the tomb."
