TENANTS' DEFENCE FUND.—A Dublin despatch says that the tenants' defence fund has been closed. The total amount of the subscription is £20,000. The largest subscriptions were received from County Cork.

ARRIVALS.—We learn from Hon. William Richards that the barkentine Bonita, Ledwell master, arrived at Kalamundburg, Dan mark, on the 19th inst.; also, that the bark Flora, Olsen master, arrived at Callao on the 19th inst.

GLAD TO HEAR IT.—The Moncton Transcript says: Mr. Paul Lee's woodworking factory is rushed with orders, more so than in any previous spring since the business was established. Mr. Lee now employs 30 men in the factory.

RUM AND JEALOUSY.—A woman named Mrs. Shaw, living on the City Road, St. John, attempted suicide a night or two ago, with carbolic acid. Jealousy and liquor are said to be at the bottom of her troubles. She will probably recover.

UNDER THE HARBOR MASTERS' ACT.—Proclamations have been issued designating the ports of House Harbor, Magdalen Islands, Que., Brudenell, King's, P. E. I., and Little Stenoigne, Westmorland Co., N. B., as under the provisions of the Harbor Masters' Act.

A SUCCESSFUL OPERATION.—J. Henderson, M. S., of North River, recently dissected a monstrosity in the shape of a calf from a two-year-old heifer belonging to Mr. John McCloskey, of Lot 30. Ottawa News Notes.

OTTAWA, May 19.

Premier Greenway, who has just arrived here reports that the crop outlook in Manitoba is excellent.

Sir Fred. Middleton has just returned from an inspection tour in West Ontario, but refuses to make known his intentions. Owing to the retirement of another member of the Wimbledon team, Lt. Manning, St. John, will be offered a place.

Hon. Mr. Tupper, who was at his office to-day, states that he is improving rapidly. He is uncertain as to whether he will return to Washington or not.

Died From His Injuries.

WOODSTOCK, N. H., May 19.

Early this morning, W. H. Shaw, employed in constructing a new turntable at Wentworth, N. H., became somewhat intoxicated, and was put out of the boarding house. He threatened the arrest of the proprietor, J. W. Emery. Upon being persuaded otherwise, he attacked Will J. Emery, son of the proprietor, 22 years old, who was at the hotel bar. He struck him, knocked him down, kicked him twice in the head, and then ran away. Emery did not live ten minutes. Shaw is in custody.

Commercial Cable Stock.

NEW YORK, May 19.

A large block of commercial cable has been sold to a London syndicate composed of parties interested in the Canadian Pacific Railway, and to-day the following directors were elected to represent this interest: Sir Donald A. Smith, W. C. Van Horne and Chas. A. Hosmer, of Montreal, and Thomas Skinner, of London. John W. McKay still holds considerably more than one-eighth of the entire capital stock.

In Favor of the Holders.

WASHINGTON, May 19.

The Supreme Court to-day rendered an opinion in favor of coupon holders on all points in the suits against the state of Virginia, arising out of the laws passed by Virginia to prevent coupon holders from compelling the State to accept coupons in payment of taxes. The decision of the Supreme Court of appeals of Virginia was reversed in each case.

Held in Bail.

BELFAST, Mo., May 19.

Lida E. Ames, charged with shooting Percy C. Rich, at Frankfort, waived examination to-day before the Police Judge and was held in \$2,000 to appear at the Supreme Court. She furnished bail. The wounded man is said to be recovering.

Young Wallace Captured.

NEW YORK, May 19.

Inspector Byrn received word this afternoon of the arrest in Havana of young Robert Wallace, who ran away two weeks ago with \$46,000 belonging to his relative, John H. Wallace, publisher of Wallace's Monthly.
