Local and Other Items.

POLICE COURT.—Albert P Allin was this morning fined \$5 or 30 days for being drunk and disorderly.

FOOTBALL.—The Wanderers won the championship of the Lower provinces on Saturday, defeating Dalhousie 6 to 5.

CMBA.—Branch No 216 CMBA, will meet in the A O H hall this evening at 8 o'clock. A full attendance is requested.

CITY OF GHENT.—The steamer City of Ghent left Halifax yesterday afternoon. She may be expected in Charlottetown on Thursday.

FROM BOSTON.—The steamer Halifax has been detained in Halifax, and is not expected in Charlottetown until this afternoon. She will leave on return to Boston as soon as possible.

PICTOU BOAT.—The Princess did not arrive from Pictou until eleven o'clock this forenoon, having been detained by thick weather. She left on return to Pictou about one o'clock.

HER LAST TRIP.—The Halifax will make her last trip for the season today. Her outward passengers will include James Beale, John Harris, W N Riggs, Miss Handrahan, Rowan C Binns, Silas Campbell, Miss G. Hant.

MORE CHEESE.—Mr T J Dillon will ship 704 boxes of cheese by the Halifax this trip. By the City of Ghent from Charlottetown he will ship about 350 boxes, whilst his shipment by the same steamer from Summerside will be upwards of 2200 boxes instead of 1920, as previously stated.

EPISCOPAL MISSION.—Bishop Courtney continued the mission in St. Peter's chapel and church yesterday afternoon and evening. The attendance was large, notwithstanding the decidedly unfavorable weather. The mission will be continued in St Peter's church this afternoon and evening, and in St. Paul's church to-morrow, Thursday and Friday.

LECTURE.—The lecture of the regular course, held fortnightly in St James' Hall under the auspices of the Y M L A, which was to take place this evening, has, owing to the St Andrew's dinner being held tonight, been postponed for one week. The lecture on Tuesday next will be delivered by Mr T C James. Subject, "Queen Elizabeth and the rise of England's naval power."

DISCOVERED A COMET.—A message received from Harvard College Observatory announces the discovery of a faint comet by Mr. Chase, assistant at the Yale Observatory, New Haven. Its position at the time of discovery, November 14, 7 29 Greenwich time, was right ascension ten hours, seven minutes, four seconds; declination north 22 degrees, 55 minutes. The comet has a daily motion in R A of 24 minutes, and in declination, four minutes.

WAS INJURED IN CHARLOTTETOWN.—Mr E T Trites, paymaster I C B., received word Saturday to the effect that his brother Mr B A Trites, the well known commercial traveller of Sussex, was seriously ill at Sydney, C B., as a result of injuries received at Charlottetown a short time ago. Mr Trites left last night for Sydney. It appears that the injured man was run over by a team in Charlottetown and sustained severe injuries internally.—Moncton Times.

ECHOES OF THE STORM.—The storm of Sunday evening was very severe in the western section of the province. The telephone service was badly demoralized, and poles were yesterday reported down in all directions. The landing pier of the lighthouse breaker at Summerside sustained some damage, and the light-keeper boat broke adrift.

A schooner loaded with oats for Toombs & Matheson, of Charlottetown, went ashore at Point Prim during the storm. A sloop was sent out from the city to bring in her cargo.

Oyster Bed Bridge is said to have been damaged; and the railway wharf at Georgetown and the ferry wharf at Montague also suffered somewhat.
