lobsters from Maine to London.

A special from Sayville, La., to the New
York Times says that the shipper of the Blue
Point oysters of the great South Bay have
received a despatch from England direc-
ting that no oysters be shipped there
for the present. It appears that the mes-
sage is based on printed statements that
oysters from certain points contain typhoid
contamination, owing to the alleged sewage de-
posit upon the oyster bed.
