Gov't Plan Seen As Support For S'side Ferry Proposal

SUMMERSIDE — The government's plan for a \$100,000 docking facilities to serve the Vacationland at Borden and Cape Tormentine was seen yesterday by Mayor W.A. Currie as proof that the ferry could be used between Summerside and Point du Chene, N.B.

The mayor said the plan was exactly in line with private information he had when the council passed his resolution last week.

The mayor felt that since the cost of the terminals would not run into the hundreds of thousands of dollars there is all the more reason why efforts should be continued to have this boat serve the needs of the western end of the province.

S'side Resident Is Fined \$125

SUMMERSIDE — A French River man pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of driving while impaired when he appeared in Summerside Police Court here yesterday morning and drew a fine of \$125 and costs.

Evidence revealed his vehicle had been in a collision with another car in which the accused's truck and the other car were badly damaged.

The man was one of three appearing on charges of driving while intoxicated. A Summerside man drew a fine of \$100 and costs on the reduced charge of impaired driving, while a Les 16 man also charged with driving while intoxicated had his case adjourned until Monday. He did not plea.

The case of Vernon Walter Watson, 29, of Malpeque, charged with the theft of a safe, was adjourned for one week.

Police Chief Peter White referred to the cases of the three men charged with driving while intoxicated as "being very serious."

Chief White said "This is serious and has got to be curbed or someone is going to be killed."

Magistrate R.S. Hinton, QC, presided.

BLOOD SERUM DRIFTS ASHORE

Miss Iphigene Arsenault of the P.E.I. Branch of the Canadian Red Cross, interestingly examines two rusted and battered tin cylinders nine inches long and 3 1/4 inches in diameter which were picked up on the beach at East Lake Sunday by William McMillan.

When opened each was found to contain a bottle of normal human serum (pooled and dried). Printed descriptive matter in the containers states the dried human serum is prepared from the blood

of voluntary donors enrolled by the Red Cross and may be given to patients of all blood types. The printed advice also suggests the keeping of a transfusion bottle of distilled water (with which the serum is mixed to be reconstituted) along with two bottles of the serum as a unit for emergency use.

Mystery of how the bottles got in the water is added to considerably by the apparent lack of relation of the bottles to each other. One is numbered Lot 256, 601 and issued Dec. 31, 1942. The other is Lot 607,210 issued Aug. 29, 1945. The date on the first suggests the possibility of its having been lost from a ship during the Second World War.

 Juice and grated rind of 1 orange and 1 lemon

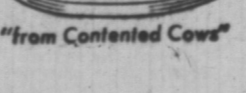

Meat Loaf: Turn meat mixture into greased loaf pan. Omit sauce. Bake in moderate oven (325°F.) about 1 hour.

Spanish Hamburgers: Prepare and broil hamburgers as for Chiliburgers, omitting sauce. Broil patties 7 minutes on each side. Mix 2 tbsps. melted butter with 2 tbsps. finely-chopped stuffed olives. Spread over broiled "burgers".
