



LOAD PULPWOOD AT SOURIS

The S. S. Uskside, docked at Souris at 10 a.m. Sunday morning June 30th. Loading operation began Monday morning at 8 a.m. She is taking on 900 cords of half peeled pulp here and will sail for Mulgrave N.S. Tuesday evening to complete her cargo of 2,300 cords and will then sail to Venice

Italy. She is under command of Capt. Irvine and has a crew of 30 officers and men. She is registered in Newport, Eng. Registered tonnage is 1,653, length 325 ft. The M. V. Bengazie docked in Souris on Thursday from Georgetown where she had taken on 600 cords of half peeled pulp. An

additional 1,110 cords were taken on here and she sailed for Rouen, France on Saturday, evening at six o'clock. The Bengazie is registered in Oslo, Norway and carries a crew of 33 under Captain Torarost. Tonnage is 1,125 and length 350 ft. She was loaded by Albert Quigley and Son.

King's County Memorial Hospital Annual Meeting

Neil Hooley, chairman of the Board of Trustees of The Kings County Memorial Hospital, presided at the annual meeting held Friday night at the Beaver Club Hall, Montague. Following the reading of the minutes of the last meeting and annual meeting, the financial report was presented as follows:

Patent revenue, \$43,769.16, other revenue, \$16,635.98, totalling \$60,405.14. Expenses amounted to \$56,677.49 before depreciation of \$6,748.03, deficit after allowing for depreciation, \$3,020.38. Assets less depreciation amounted to \$111,275.18. Liabilities amounted to \$23,128.21, of which \$20,000.00 is the balance of the bond issue of the hospital building.

Mrs. Vera MacDonald, Matron, then gave her report, followed by the Auxiliary report presented by Mrs. Florence Stewart; Beaver Club report presented by Mrs. A. C. MacKay, and the Nursery Club report presented by Mrs. Vic Pepler.

Dr. MacIntyre gave the report for the medical staff and spoke of the excellent co-operation with both the nursing and medical staff.

Neil Hooley then spoke on the year's activities and the progress

in general made over the past four or five years. Mr. Hooley was then re-appointed as chairman, and James Cain was appointed to replace John A. MacDonald, M.P.

The Hon. Dr. Lorne Bonnell, Minister of Health, spoke words of praise for the late Dr. Harold Shaw, and expressed sympathy for Mrs. Shaw and the family.

Dr. Bonnell went on to say that the Government Hospital Plan was being studied and that there would likely be need for larger hospitals, staff and facilities with the acceptance of the plan. This in turn would create a need for an active medical staff and boards. He then moved a vote of thanks to Mr. Hooley for his past services.

Mr. Hooley reported the purchase of a new X-Ray machine. Among those present was Senator Elsie Inman, who spoke briefly, commending the board and staff on their progress.

It was moved that the medical board be re-appointed, with power to add to their number. Leslie Hunter moved a vote of thanks to the various ladies organizations, and Ivor Phillips moved that the board appoint advisory members.

Mr. Hooley extended his personal thanks to Mrs. MacDonald, the nursing staff and the maintenance staff.

A vote of thanks was offered to Dr. MacIntyre, Mr. Wightman, Judge DesRoches and Mr. Hunter.
