

Her Majesty Wants To See Canadians Work And Play

OTTAWA (CP) — The Queen wants to see how Canadians live, work and play.

She has personally listed those aims for this summer's 12,000-mile Royal Tour and organizers are doing their best to meet her wishes.

"This was disclosed Thursday by Manitoba-born Esmond Butler, her press secretary for the six-week, meet-the-people visit that is being streamlined to eliminate all possible fuss and frills.

"I think I can say there will be no unrollings and no tree plantings," smiled Mr. Butler, the Canadian personally picked by the Queen to handle tour arrangements.

INTRIGUED BY NORTH

Mr. Butler, just back from an eight-day rehearsal of the Eastern Canadian section of the tour, said at a press conference the Queen also wanted:

To visit Canada's North because her husband, Prince Philip, who will accompany her this summer, was so enthusiastic about what he saw on a solo trip there in 1934;

To know how Canadians spend their summer. Therefore, arrangements are being made for the royal couple to have a rest "somewhere" in British Columbia and to spend some time on a farm in Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Butler, the first Canadian to hold a post in the royal household, has spent the last year at Buckingham Palace.

From that background, he said "hardly a day goes by" without the Queen making some decision concerning the June 18-Aug. 1 tour, longest visit to one country by a British sovereign.

TRIM CEREMONIES

In contrast to many royal visits, the emphasis will be on cut-

ting official engagements to a minimum.

The Queen, said Mr. Butler, wants to see Canadians at work, the miner at the rock-face, the machinist at his lathe, and so on.

Among other activities mentioned Thursday were a ball in Montreal, a big horse race in Toronto and visits to mines and newsprint companies in Newfoundland.

Mr. Butler, with chief tour planner Gen. Howard Graham, returned to Ottawa after a "dry run" trip over the eastern part of the tour, covering St. John's, Gander, Deer Lake, Corner Brook, Harmon air base, Schefferville and Knob Lake in Newfoundland; Sept Iles, Que., and the Gaspé; and several communities in the Maritime provinces.

Gen. Graham and Mr. Butler leave Monday on another preliminary run, this time to the West and North.
