Home Economics Program At High School

The girls of Grades 7, 8 and 9 took part in a Home Economics program in the auditorium of the Queen Charlotte High School yesterday afternoon.

The stage was decorated with apple blossoms and bouquets of cut flowers. Those on stage taking "speaking" parts were as follows: "Gail Williams who welcomed those present; Shirley Bolmer, commentator; Marlene Buell who described the Grade VII course; Daphne Armstrong and Dorothy Sherren, who gave a demonstration on preparing breakfast fruit; Joyce Archer, who described the Grade VIII course; Gloria Stewart and Anne MacKay, who demonstrated Potato and Egg Salad; Joan Cudmore, who described the Grade IX course; and Sylvia Taylor and Dianne Bennett, who demonstrated a tossed Green Salad.

The girls in each grade modelled the garments they made in their sewing classes, to music supplied by Miss Ruth Boswell. The grade 7 students each made and modelled a gathered cotton skirt; the Grade VIII cotton blouses, skirts, and shorts; the Grade IX girls cotton dresses and various other outfits.

Other garments made but not modelled on stage were on display in the auditorium. Sample meals of breakfast, dinner, and supper, representing the work in Grades 7, 8, and 9 respectively, and following Canada's Food Rules for one day, were also shown. Notebooks kept by pupils and reference books in Home Economics were featured on another table.

In her closing remarks the commentator read "A Girl's Creed" which pointed out the inherent value of Home Economics training and of homemaking itself whether as a public or private career.

Increase Shown In Freight Traffic

The monthly report for May on the movement of freight by the Borden-Tormentine ferry as released yesterday by the Canadian National Railways, Island Division, shows an increase of exports to the mainland of slightly over 40 per cent over the number of carloads for the same month of 1955. For the same period the shipments from Tormentine to the Island declined.

The total number of cars moved from Borden to Tormentine was 1311 carloads as compared to 927 for the same period last year. The main item responsible for the increase was: (1955 in brackets) Potatoes 777 (510) this was followed by turnips 104 (50), livestock 120 (83), miscellaneous 94 (60), scrap iron 28 (5), hides 5 (0), canned goods 7 (3) and cutter and cheese 2 (0). Roughwood was down 39 (61) also eggs 8 (15), meats 25 (27) and vegetables 2 (4).

On the import side 1976 carloads were moved from Tormentine to Borden as against 2151 in May 1955. Gas and oils were down 143 (260), lime 375 (383), autos 86 (106) miscellaneous 101 (117), sand, stone, gravel, brick and cement 96 (166), lumber 17 (25), canned goods 10 (15) and meats 15 (18). The commodities arriving in greater quantities were coal, 87 (66) fertilizer 474 (419) less carload lots 264 (256), salt 18 (15), aerated waters, 12 (8) and vegetables 9 (6).
