# The Movie 'My Fair Lady' Pleases Centre Audience

Eliza Dolittle bloomed her way into a great number of hearts at Confederation Centre Theatre last night.  
Eliza is the little flowergirl-become-lady played by Audrey Hepburn in what is billed as "the most lovely motion picture of all time," My Fair Lady.  
And what a lovely picture it is. Everything is coming up, if not roses, at least flowers. What a beautiful flowery opening. What a charming use of color. It left the audience gasping. Pure white peonies cast under the magic spell of color upon color.  
**USED EXTENSIVELY**  
Contrasting colors or dull grey colors, depending on the mood to be created, were used extensively in every scene. Who

could have thought that the England which travel posters rave about could look so absolutely dull. At times the whole world was grey, but only when Miss Dolittle was not around.  
The movie presents a mixed bouquet of characters. Miss Dolittle herself, really does quite a bit. Not every London lass could change from a street corner flower-girl to a Hungarian princess. Funny thing, when she's selling flowers she looks like a girl who got old before her time but when she's got the professor in mind she looks like a flower. Miss Hepburn as Miss Dolittle sings a number of charming songs, with or without that English accent.  
The professor she has in mind is none other than Professor Henry Higgins, or 'Erny Higgins to you captain.  
The professor Rex Harrison had this thing about phonetics. He just couldn't understand why English people didn't teach their children to speak properly. He was the typical male of the species, ever ready to accept honor and applause regardless to whom the spotlight beamed. Actually he was the type who wouldn't have surprised the audience in the least if he had had himself stuffed and hung above the mantel.

However, he did believe in protecting his interests.  
Eliza's father was very typical of the song he sang, "With A Little Bit Of Luck." Wanting to be a dutiful father, if it meant an extra beer for him, he was right behind Eliza all the way, when she had a bit of cash.  
The story revolves around the finding of Miss Dolittle, the flowergirl who spoke "castly English" by Professor Higgins and his bet with Colonel Pickering that he could make her fit to visit Buckingham Palace in six months.  
A GOOD GILL  
The fun that results has got to be seen to be appreciated. Miss Dolittle insists that she is a "good girl" and has never been "wet all over" when it's time for Professor Higgins housekeeper to clean her up a bit.  
Then of course there's that minor incident at the Ascot races when Eliza lets the cat out of the bag and tells about her grandmother being "done in" for a straw hat.  
There's much more to be said about this delightful musical but seeing is believing. The winner of eight Academy Awards, My Fair Lady, plays tonight and tomorrow at Confederation Centre Theatre.

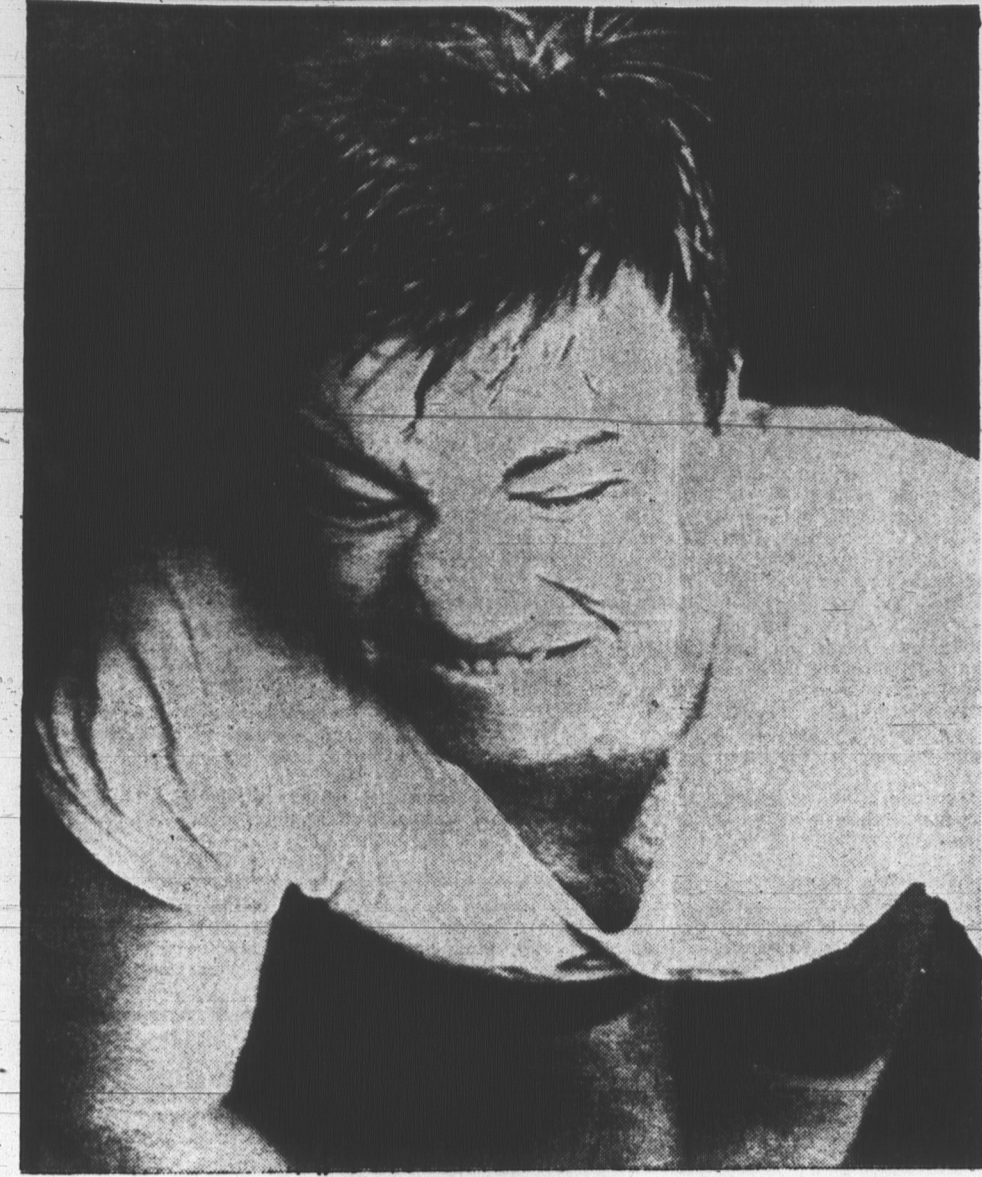
