THE hay crop of Madawaska vicinity and the Upper St. John, on the provincial side, is very light, in fact not enough to supply the lumbering operations there during the coming winter. So far from any hay being imported from the section of Maine, it is thought that considerable quantities will go the other way.

A SMALL quantity of fine salt, in bags, which arrived at Liverpool, N. S., on the 10th inst., in the barque Maiden City, was seized by the officers there on account of the non-payment of duty. The bulk of coarse salt, which composed the cargo of the vessel, was regularly entered, but the fine salt was not, hence the seizure.

BRUTALITY.—David Reid, of the Royal Munster Fusiliers, and his wife, Annie Reid, were arraigned before the Police Court in Halifax, on Friday last, for brutally ill-using their child. The evidence brought out at the trial showed that the child was kept in one of the filthiest places in Halifax, and that her mother showed greater kindness towards her cat than to her offspring.

AN excursion and tea party will be held at St. Peter's on the 23rd inst., in aid of the new R. C. Chapel now in course of erection. Divine Service will be held in the Church at 10.30 a. m., on which occasion Rev. Alexander McGillicuddy will preach in Gaelic and English. First Fruits of the New Act.

LONDON, Aug. 14. The Grenadier and the Coldestream Guards have arrived in Alexandria.

The National Land League opened its session in Manchester. There were over 3,000 delegates present.

Francis Hynes, who was arrested under the Suppression of Crime Act, was, to-day, found guilty of the murder of Francis Dougherty, in Ennis, Ireland. This is the first trial under the new Act.

ANTARTIC DANCERS.

A Minister's Son

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.

News has been received here of the total wreck of the Antarctic exploring expedition near Cape Horn. The crew was saved by the ship Allan Gordon.

Norman McLeod, son of the late Rev. Dr. McLeod, of Glasgow, was arrested in New York a few days ago, charged with swindling a number of wholesale jewelers. He has been acting for some time back as a jewellery broker, and latterly obtained, on false pretences, several valuable diamonds and other precious stones. He sold these articles and appropriated the proceeds. He was to-day committed for trial.

Disastrous Fire at Quebec.

QUEBEC, Aug. 14.

A terrible fire broke out here on Saturday evening. The fire started in the St. Sauver suburb, and was not checked until the flames had succeeded in destroying fifty thousand dollars worth of property. The most painful part of the loss is that incurred by the poor people. The fire took place in a part that was inhabited by working families, and containing mostly very small houses. Four persons were seriously injured.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 11.

It is reported that Arabi Pasha is two miles from Ismailia.

The conduct of DeLesseps is causing complications.

The enemy is working hard on a new line of intrenchments.

Arabi Pasha is having constructed, within 5,000 yards of Ramleh, a formidable redan and embankment, 30 feet high. H. M. S. Superb fired shells at the works to-day, four of which burst in close proximity to the men engaged in construction.

A Circassian brought in yesterday, who has passed Arabi's camp, states that a colonel, a captain, a subaltern and 76 men were killed on the rebel side in the engagement on Saturday. He says twenty-five battalions and eleven batteries are posted along the canal between Kafr El Dwar and the advanced outposts. An Egyptian trooper of the Khedive's guard was taken prisoner yesterday. A paper in Arabic was found on him. The probability is he was making for Arabi's camp.

The Duke of Connaught, in an interview with the Khedive, conveyed a verbal message from Queen Victoria, expressing her deep sympathy and best wishes for the Khedive and Egypt.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 11.

Turkish journals are assuming a friendly tendency towards England. Sheik Ul Islam has prohibited Ulemas from preaching in favor of Arabi Pasha.

PARIS, Aug. 11.

A letter received here states that the condition of Tripoli is alarming to the Europeans.

A despatch from Constantinople announces that the Porte after settling affairs in Egypt, intends to send an army to drive the French out of Tunis. The natives talk of a massacre of the Christians.

GALVESTON, Tex., Aug. 11.

Deaths from fever at Matamoros for the twenty-four hours ending yesterday were forty, and at Brownsville thirteen.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 11.

The British barque Jardine Brothers, owned by Ritchie & Co., Liverpool, salt laden, bound to Miranichi, was totally wrecked at St. Pierre, on Tuesday. The crew were saved; also a considerable portion of the cargo.
