NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—King Humbert's life was insured for \$7,000,000. It is believed that British companies held the policies.

—The people of Canada are now paying twelve and a half million dollars more in taxes to the Government of Canada than they ever paid before!

—The bulk of our hay crop has been secured in good order—and it was a better crop, upon the whole, than some persons thought that it would be.

—In 1896 the expenditure of the Government of Canada, per head of the population, amounted to \$8.14; in 1899 to \$9.72. In 1896 the extravagant Tories were in office; in 1899 the Liberals, par excellence, who promised to reduce the expenditure by \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000 a year.

—The Liberals have had their opportunity—a grand opportunity—to reform the Government of Canada as they promised to do—and they have missed it. There is now more corruption in the administration of public affairs than ever, higher expenditure than ever, more taxes paid than ever, a heavier debt than ever. Turn them out.

—According to the London Times the figures given by Mr. Brodrick in parliament show that the Chinese are in possession of extensive supplies of guns and ammunition. Since 1895, arms in Great Britain have furnished the Chinese government with 71 guns of position and 11,740 rounds of ammunition; 123 field guns and 40,400 rounds; and 297 machine guns with over four million rounds.

—The exports of the United States during the last fiscal year exceeded those of 1898 99 by \$317,749,250 no less than \$95,608,000 of this being in manufactures. The Montreal Gazette aptly remarks that to some who have been accepting what has been said about the development of Canada's foreign trade, the singular thing about this remarkable record will be that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had nothing to do with it.

—“One who knows” writes to contradict the statement of a correspondent of The Patriot, to the effect that the survey of the Belfast and Murray Harbor has been completed. But our correspondent thinks that “it will be completed when Sir Louis comes home.” We shall see. As to the grading, the same correspondent says: “They have graded the road, in spots, up to Village Green; but past that there is nothing done.”

Montreal Gazette: The secret of the trip to Paris of Sir L. H. Davies, and Messrs. Fielding and Blair, seems to be out. La Patrie announces that they will embark on Thursday for Canada with Mr. Tarte. Probably less than three could not have done the job.

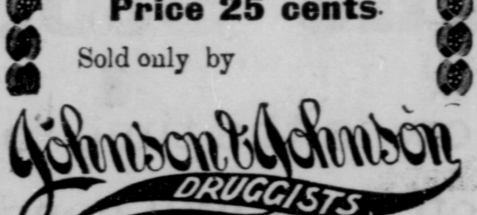
