

City Council Decides To Ask For Daylight Time

Charlottetown's City Council is once again seeking the establishment of Daylight Saving Time throughout the Province during the summer season. A resolution to this effect was passed at a special meeting of the civic administrative body held Saturday afternoon.

Introduced by Councillor Gerald R. Foster the resolution asks the Legislature to amend the Time Uniformity Act "to provide for the establishment of Daylight Saving Time throughout the Province from June 15 to September 15 in each and any year."

In asking approval of this motion Councillor Foster stated, "It is incumbent on us to present this motion at all sessions of the local Legislature."

Passage of such legislation was important to the "health and com-

Easter Services Held In Protestant Churches

Bright sunshine and seasonally warm temperatures contributed to an exceptionally large attendance of the Easter services held in the City yesterday. Overflow congregations were in evidence wherever worship was held.

Beautiful floral decorations and special Easter music added coupled with the singing of greatly to solemn occasion of Remembrance.

TWO SERVICES

Two morning services were held at Trinity. The first at 9 o'clock saw the observance of Holy Communion. The Choir under Royston F. Myford rendered special music, including the rendition of the Hallelujah Chorus. Miss Joyce MacCallum was soloist singing, "I know that my Redeemer liveth".

Rev. G. Howard Christie presided at the meditations during the early service and Rev. A. Frank MacLean preached the sermon at 11 o'clock.

The evening service was devoted to special Easter music featuring the combined senior, the junior boys' and girls' choirs comprising over 150 voices. Soloists in the senior choir were George Johnston, Maida Rogerson, Madge Muford and William K. Rogers. Girl soloists were Lynne Johnston, Sandra Kennedy, Sandra Johnston and Fay Edwards. Boy soloists were Roddy Diamond and Ian Hume.

Holy Communion was again served at the conclusion of the evening service.

COMMISSION PERTURBED

The playgrounds Commission was "quite perturbed" at the City's failure to increase their annual grant to \$5,000 as requested in their brief to Council, Councillor Boyle declared.

"They need new equipment, salaries are up, while at the same time they are trying to provide more and better playgrounds for the children of the City," he said.

"There have been a lot of changes since the original grant was established in 1946," Councillor Boyle noted, adding that to even keep up their present standards the Commission will need "a lot more than they can raise."

At a pre-budget meeting we decided to let this matter stand," Councillor A. Walthen Gaudet, chairman of the finance committee stated, adding that it was the feeling of the committee that should the Commission make some specific request, an upwards revision could be made.

The Mayor asked that the matter be stood over to the next regular Council meeting, and requested that Councillor Boyle ask the Commission to prepare a budget of their anticipated expenditure for presentation at that time.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS

Other resolutions passed at this meeting approved the appointment of Lt.-Col. Frank J. Storey, Councillor A. J. Haslam, and Mr. Frank MacDonald as members of the town planning committee, Lt.-Col. Storey being designated as chairman; and approved the appointment of Councillors H. E. Hyndman and P. E. O'Neill, and City Clerk J. James A. Fullerton as representatives of the City Council on the Co-ordinating Committee of the Red Cross Disaster Relief; granted the City Clerk the authority to advertise for rental space in the basement of the Market Building; expressed Council's appreciation to the Junior Board of Trade for sponsoring a local "clean-up week"; authorized the City Clerk to purchase three new machines for writing tax receipts; and accepted the offer of Mr. Frank Hansen "to convey to the city a street or news extending eastward from the eastern side of Goodwill Avenue for a distance of 230 feet of which the westward 160 feet is 50 feet in width and the eastward 70 feet is 60 feet in width."

which was subsequently passed Councillor A. Walthen Gaudet stated that the first draft of the Bill was not in accordance with the spirit of the resolution relative to this matter approved by the prior Council on December 16.

CRUX OF AMALGAMATION

"Water and sewerage is the crux of any scheme of amalgamation," Councillor Gaudet declared, adding that it involves "the biggest spending."

"Without control of this important item, all our work on amalgamation was just so much time wasted," he said.

Referring to the imminent inclusion of the Village of Spring Park in the City, Councillor Gaudet asked, "How can we promise these people adequate services, if we have no control?"

In this connection the Chairman of the City Council's finance committee recalled that several sections of the present incorporated area "for umpteen years" had clamored in vain for revision or improvement in their existing services.

The fact that none of the present Commissioners had attended even a single meeting of the Metropolitan Commission, and the fact that the Commission were seeking legislative approval of amending legislation without according Council the courtesy of prior examination, were cited as examples of the Commissioners'

RED AID FOR CASTRO?

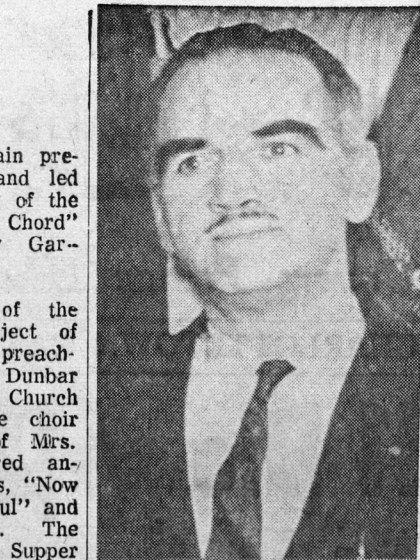

45-Minute Power Failure Sunday

A large number of Charlottetown residents were left without electric power early last night when a power failure developed on Weymouth Street.

The break occurred about 5:10 p.m. and lasted for 45 minutes. It was caused by some children who threw a piece of bone attached to a wire across the high-tension wires causing a short-circuit. No one was hurt during the incident but Maritime Electric officials stated that this was a dangerous practice.

Nuclear Bomb Protest Army Stages March

READING, England (CP) - A small army of men, women and children protesting against nuclear weapons wound through the countryside west of London Sunday.

During their 13-mile trek, the number of marchers more than doubled to an estimated 1,000 stretched out over three-quarters of a mile.

Sunday night they moved into this Berkshire County town at the end of their next-to-last lap on the way to the British atomic weapons research station at Aldermaston.

The marchers covered 12 miles the first day, 17 miles Saturday, and have a further 10 miles to go today before their arrival at Aldermaston. They have been sleeping in church halls, private homes, tents and wherever they can find shelter.

CONTRARY TO SPIRIT

The manner in which the Commission operated was contrary to the spirit of the enabling legislation as he interpreted it, Councillor Gaudet contended. Persuasion of the Acts showed that early civic legislators had envisaged "close co-operation between the citizens, the Council and the Commission," he said.

"The present members of the Commission are well-qualified for the job," Councillor Gaudet declared, adding that they were "elected by the citizens as a separate body, and now are to be abolished because their actions do not agree with certain members of the Council."

"We should have had a plebiscite on this matter," the Ward One representative asserted.

Accused by Councillor Gerald R. Foster of reversing his stand since last fall, Councillor Gormley retorted that he had not supported the resolution passed at that time.

Councillor Gormley's opinion that no members of the present Council were capable of assuming the duties and responsibilities of the Commission in the event of these powers being placed in their hands.

In answer to this objection Councillor Gaudet stated that newly-elected Councillors were usually quite unfamiliar with the work of Council, but by progressing from less important to more important committees eventually became completely competent.

The addition of two new Councillors from Spring Park would add two members to the Council's present working force, he noted.

In support of Mr. Gaudet's stand, Councillor Foster observed that the Commission had failed to produce "a progressive policy of expansion."

Councillor O'Neill, while endorsing Councillor Gormley's assessment of the personal capacities of the members of the present Commission, noted that they suffered from "inherited" prior holders of the same office.

Too much emphasis was placed on "sinking funds, payment of interest, and establishing surpluses," he said.

Further discussion of this legislation will take place this morning at a meeting of Council scheduled for 9:00 a.m. Former Mayor, and now one of the two members representing the City in the local House, Hon. B. Earle MacDonald, has been invited to attend.
