MANUAL TRAINING SCHOOLS.

As a matter of course Professor Robertson's proposition, submitted to the meeting of citizens held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall yesterday afternoon, was unanimously and gladly approved and accepted. The proposition was supported by a very able and convincing address, the climax of which was reached when it was announced that the proposed Manual Training School would be supplied for three years without any expense on the part of the province or its people, the whole cost being defrayed by an unknown benefactor. We have no doubt that the generous gentleman, whoever he may be, will be rewarded by the consciousness of having performed a superlatively great service for Canada as well as by the special thanks of each community in which his schools may be established.

Among the many remarkable sayings of Thomas Carlyle was one to the effect that "a man perfects himself much more by work than by reading." That is to say, work is better than reading for the improvement of the intellect and the moral sense, as well as for the development of the body. This may account for the fact that the children of the poor, who are compelled to work, are in so many cases more successful at school and prove to be better men and women than those children of the rich who live in idleness. It may also account for the fact that boys and girls from the country who have "done chores" and "made things" from their infancy, are better scholars than boys and girls in the city who are relieved of the necessity to work. However this may be we hail with great pleasure the movement inaugurated by the wealthy friend of Professor Robertson.

CHICKEN FATTENING STATIONS

Two chicken fattening stations will be established in this Province, under government auspices,—one at Summerside and one in Charlottetown. The idea is, not to encourage our farmers to engage in chicken fattening, but to provide a means by which they can sell chickens at a profit to men who make chicken fattening for the British and other markets a specialty. Good large chickens of the Plymouth Rock, Wyandotte and Light Brahma varieties are the more desirable. It is expected that each station in this Province will fatten four hundred chickens this fall,—two hundred immediately and two hundred later. The chickens will be obtained from farmers and others in the vicinity of Charlottetown and Summerside; and the experiment will be continued for three years. If successful, the trade will, of course, as in England and France, and other countries, be carried on by private enterprise. We have little doubt that a considerable amount of clear money will ere long, be flowing into this province as a result of chicken and turkey culture,—particularly if direct steamship communication should be established with Great Britain. In the meantime, and in any case, our farmers and chicken fanciers will do well if they breed the varieties of fowl most approved for fattening purposes.

MANUAL TRAINING SCHOOLS!

the speaker said no such result from manual training is possible. Manual training corrects the one-sidedness of book-study, by aiding the moral perception. A school system which fails to educate morally is utterly defective; for all the powers of the pupil must be developed so that he can bring them all to bear upon any object.

The speaker admitted his sympathy and admiration for the dull boy. He is usually behind in abstract and book-studies but is ahead in manual training, and feels a sense of triumph when engaged in it.

In Canada, manual training should progress as in England. In Ottawa recently it was strongly urged and the teachers wished it to be made an optional subject. Prof. Robertson in his plan for the new system has selected Charlottetown as a centre of operation. His coming here on this mission has been the result of an offer made him by a friend who proposes to devote his wealth and latter years to this most important branch of education.

If Charlottetown is willing to take it up, it will cost the people nothing. A three years trial will be given; and if, after that time, it is satisfactory, it is hoped the School Board will take it in hand, or it may be dropped entirely. The best teacher procurable will be brought from England who will teach others here. Some teachers will go from Canada to Europe to see the educational methods there, and receive instruction, spending several months in England and several months in Sweden. Under such conditions, manual training should succeed. The boys and girls will have a far better opportunity of obtaining more happiness through life; and it will benefit the great cause of humanity.

At the close of the address Dr. Taylor asked some questions pertinent to the offer of financial assistance, and having received satisfactory answers declared himself to be unreservedly and enthusiastically in favor of accepting it. He had long been in favor of manual training the value of which he illustrated by reference to the lives of the great surgeons Sir William Ferguson and Dr. Lawson Tait,—both of whom had in early life specially trained their eyes and hands for the work in which they have gained a distinction beyond that of all others of their age.

Dr. Anderson was very much in favor of the proposition and saw no reason why the people of Charlottetown should not grasp at a thing of such very great importance, especially when the expense was to them nothing. In closing, Dr. Anderson, was happy in moving a very hearty vote of thanks to the speaker for his excellent address and the good news he had brought.

The motion was seconded by Senator Ferguson, who referred to the great services Professor Robertson had rendered this Province together with all Canada, and said that he had great faith in the success of any enterprise promoted by him.

F. L. Hazard, Esq., supported the motion and criticised some methods now followed in our public schools,—notably the monthly written examinations.

After the motion was put and carried, Dr. Taylor moved that a committee be appointed to take any necessary action,—said committee to consist of Dr. Anderson, Principal Seaman, Principal Landrigan, and Messrs Blanchard and D. C. McLeod, of the city School Board.

Mr. Cotton seconded the motion and suggested the addition to the committee of the names of Dr. Taylor and the Superintendent of Education.

The motion carried and the meeting adjourned.
