The Morell Women's Institute held its 32nd birthday, Thursday evening, with a celebration in the form of a banquet at the Hill Side Inn, Montague.

Following a delicious turkey dinner and a toast to the Queen, Mrs. Maude Steele, R.N., gave a concise history of the group. A special welcome was extended to the following charter members who were present: Mrs. J. A. O'Brien, Mrs. J. B. Jay, Mrs. J. E. Rossiter, Mrs. Edward Rossiter and Mrs. A. B. MacAdam. Mrs. Gordon Coffin then proposed a toast to absent members.

This was followed by an address of welcome by the president, Mrs. Wm. Aylward. The following is the history of the Institute as read by Mrs. Maude Steele, R.N.

The Morell Women's Institute was organized in the month of June in the year 1925, and was incorporated in the year 1936.

The motto "For home and country" has been closely adhered to by the members of this Institute throughout the thirty two years of its service to the community.

In the early years a new school was built in the district and over five thousand dollars was donated to it by the Institute.

Through the years money was expended in various ways to further the interest of education in this district. Prizes and treats were given to the children semi-annually, picnics were sponsored, the interior and exterior of the school was painted, play ground equipment supplied, flowers and shrubs planted and cared for by the zealous members, furnishings were supplied for the school and the yard was fenced and painted.

Music and singing were taught the pupils and a company of Girl Guides sponsored.

During the war parcels were sent to boys overseas and when Bristol, Eng., was bombed a mammoth Bristol day was held in Morell, sponsored by the Women's Institute for which a cable-

gram Thank You was received from the mayor of Bristol.

In war as in peace, the members are ever ready to serve the cause of humanity, the Red Cross, T.B. League, Cancer Fund, Blood donor clinic, March of Dimes and Easter campaign for crippled children all find willing workers in our organization.

At present the new high school is one of our major projects and a donation of a considerable sum of money has been received to this worthy venture.

And have we enjoyed our years of Institute activity? The answer is yes even though we plunged knee deep through snow to attend some of our monthly meetings and returned home via horse drawn vehicles, one such occasion I am sure will long be remembered by the members present. We had our social evenings too, and a chicken supper at Mrs. James O'Brien's to which members came in all manner of conveyances, even to the lowly hand sleigh.

That we may strive to continue this great work through the years to come is my most sincere wish.
