Missing Boy Search In Alta. Conducted By Souris Native

GEORGTOWN — The experience of a Calgary RCMP officer who conducted many aircraft searches in the Arctic paid off recently when he found five-year-old Glenn Morgan of Calgary. The RCMP officer who conducted the search, Cpl. Alton MacKenzie, formerly Cpl. Souris and son of Mr. and Mrs. Alton MacKenzie, Charlotetown.
The Calgary boy was missing for 26 hours in dense bush at Jumping Point west of the city. Cpl. MacKenzie organized a task force of civilians, soldiers, cowboys and policeman in the area.
An estimated 140 men, mounted and on foot, combed the bush for the boy. "We got to the scene at 5:45 on Sunday," Cpl. MacKenzie said. "The bush there is so thick the problem was to keep the line straight." Cpl. MacKenzie said. On the second sweep mounted cowboys were posted on the flanks and rear of the search line and soldiers with radios were spotted among the searchers. "A big thing was communication," the RCMP man said, "and the cowboys and farmers really knew the area."
Cpl. MacKenzie was complimented by his commanding officer for the manner in which he conducted proceedings.

SOUTH KINGS POWER KO'D BY LIGHTNING

Despite the wide area covered by the heavy electrical storms of yesterday, officials of the Maritime Electric Company Ltd. last night reported that power systems throughout the province suffered very little damage.
The only section of the Island that was without light and power for any length of time was that of the Montague, Murray River, Murray Harbor and Wood Islands areas.
It was reported that the blackout, which occurred at Montague at about 1:30 yesterday afternoon and lasted for some five hours, was caused by heavy lightning blew out the main transmission lines feeding the area from the substation at Summersville.
Officials reported that the Murray River and Harbor section were back in service shortly after 6 p.m., with the remaining circuit feeding to Wood Islands restored by 6 o'clock.
