THE MONCTON TRAGEDY
Additional Evidence.
MONCTON, Aug. 5.
The preliminary examination of the prisoner Buck or Olsen will probably be concluded to-day. Thomas Buckley, an I. C. R. brakeman, was the only new evidence. He saw the prisoner in a clinch with Officer Steadman, fire two shots.
MONTREAL, Aug. 5.
John E. Grosse, of the Canadian Secret Service Agency, is assured that it was Buck Whalen and Jim Christie who did the shooting at Moncton. They are just out of the Vermont state prison.
McCarthyites in Caucus.
Preliminary Measures.
LONDON, Aug. 5.
Sixty-six McCarthyites met yesterday and re-elected Justin McCarthy as sessional chairman; Mr. Deasy, Sir T. Esmond, Mr. Molloy, and Dr. Tanner as whip, and Arthur O'Connor and Donald Sullivan as secretaries. The meeting chose the following members as an executive committee: Blake, Davitt, Dillon, T. M. Healy, Wm. O'Brien, Arthur O'Connor and Sexton.
Mr. McCarthy was re-elected to keep the differences of the Irish party in abeyance. The rival leaders personally have less authority than ever. They cannot answer telegrams about the position of affairs without submitting them to the real working chiefs.
It was decided that the McCarthyites will continue to sit on the Opposition side of the House, though they will co-operate with Mr. Gladstone on the Home Rule Bill.
Incendiarism at Dorchester.
DORCHESTER, Aug. 5.
An attempt was made to fire this town yesterday. The fire was discovered about three o'clock in a barn belonging to the Weldon House which was damaged. Fire was also discovered in a kitchen in Judge Landry's residence and other places, but was extinguished before much damage was done. Judge Fraser yesterday sentenced Sears for escaping from the penitentiary, to a year's additional imprisonment, and Staples, for the same offence, to six months' additional imprisonment. Bailey, for bigamy, was sentenced to two years; Lewis, for indecent assault, to six months in jail and seven lashes.

HALIFAX, Aug. 5.
The cricket match, Halifax against Ottawa, was won by the latter with sixteen runs.
Ottawa's umpire gave several rank decisions, which it is claimed gave the match to Ottawa.
