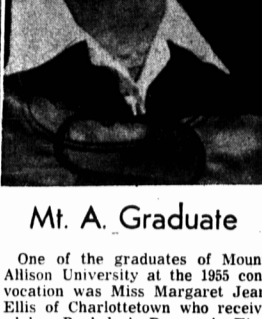

Sifton, Man. Calls Itself Disaster Area

BRANDON, Man. (CP)—Sifton municipality, hit by a ramazing creek, a swollen lake and facing yet another flood threat, declared itself a disaster area and appealed Wednesday for provincial and federal aid. The municipal council said in a resolution that owing to severe flooding conditions throughout a large portion of the municipality "we declare the entire area in a state of emergency and ask the senior governments to provide a measure of assistance." An estimated 30,000 acres of rich farm land are covered by water from the boiling Pipestone creek. The creek empties into Oak Lake, also located in the municipality, and flood waters from Saskatchewan lake level to the highest point in the living memory. Heavy damage is being done to cottages, boats and bathhouses. EXPECT FLOOD CREST The Assiniboine river carrying flood waters from Saskatchewan, passes through the northern half of the municipality. One of two flood crests has already reached the area but has caused no apparent damage. It was 25 miles upstream from Brandon Wednesday. But still to come is the second and larger crest, located Wednesday between Tantallon, Sask., and St. Lazare. The water level at that point is expected to rise one-half foot above the 1954 flood level. Workers built dikes around three St. Lazare homes along the Assiniboine side of the highway. Five thousand sand bags were put down to protect the road from the Qu'Appelle river. Workers continued to strengthen the dike system in Brandon. The preparation for the flood crest in the first is expected some time Friday and the second next Monday or Tuesday.

Managing Editor Moncton Paper Dies Suddenly

MONCTON (CP)—J. Clair Gannon, 55, managing editor of the Moncton Transcript, died Wednesday night after suffering a heart attack. His son, Peter, 17, was killed in a highway accident last July. He is survived by his widow. Mr. Gannon was appointed managing editor in 1947 after serving as editor-in-chief of the Moncton dailies since their merger in 1945. He had previously been editor of The Transcript. His disposition made him a host of friends in his newspaper and army careers. He was public relations officer, with the rank of captain, for the New Brunswick military district before the Second World War ended and formerly served with reserve army units. Born at Sluder Mountain Kings county, he spent most of his life in Moncton and attended Mount Allison University and the Nova Scotia Technical College.

Western Powers Welcome New Soviet Proposal

By MOSHIN ALI LONDON (Reuters)—The Western powers Wednesday welcomed a new Soviet disarmament proposal as a major advance toward their views on how to halt the world arms race. Statements from the British, French and American delegates attending the current five-power disarmament talks here said Russia has made concessions on major points which have until now hamstrung negotiations. And in Paris, External Affairs Minister Pearson, who has represented Canada at various times at the five-power disarmament talks, told a press conference the Russian proposals are "interesting and may be important." Some Western officials regarded the Moscow plan, announced earlier Wednesday at a meeting of Communist nations in Warsaw as a move to ease the cold war comparable with Russia's agreement to an Austrian state treaty.

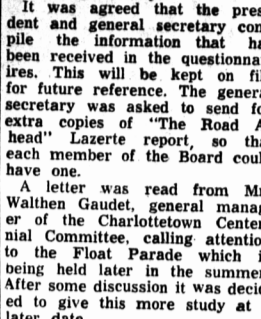

Merger of Two Big Rail Unions Seen Possible

OTTAWA (CP)—Tentative moves behind the scenes for an amalgamation of two of Canada's largest transport unions have been stimulated by the prospective merger of two labor congresses. The suggested amalgamation—still in a highly nebulous stage—would unite the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees (CBE) and the rival Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks (AFL-TLC) into Canada's third-biggest union. The CBE, with close to 40,000 members, is Canada's largest transport union and also the largest non-international union. The Clerks, an international body, have 21,000 members in Canada under Frank H. Hall, head negotiator for the "non-operating" unions on the railways. THIRD LARGEST A merger would place a CBE-Clerks union in third spot in size behind the CIO-CCL steel and auto groups, each of which has about 70,000 members in this country. It also would eliminate overlapping jurisdictions between the two unions, who next year will be allied as members of the new Canadian Labor Congress to be formed through merger of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada and the Canadian Congress of Labor. It became known Wednesday that more than two years ago the CBE put out amalgamation feelers to the clerks and to other non-operating unions with a view to pooling their strength. Nothing developed out of the overtures. CAUTIOUS COMMENT But a few days ago in Boston, labor quarters here heard Wednesday that the Austrian independence convention that there is "an exceedingly important possibility" of a merger. He said it is probable an exploratory joint committee will be set up shortly. CBE officials were cautious about commenting, but "we are prepared to explore any possibilities with Hall or with representatives of any other railway union," said CBE president W. J. Smith.

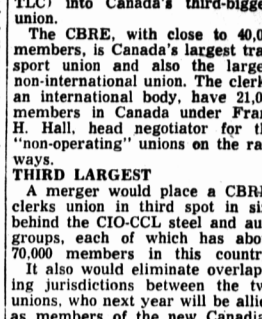
