MR. GARDINER, in a letter to the Secretary of the Advisory Board, says: "Our grains are a great attraction. There is, so far, nothing in the Exhibition equal to them in quality."

THE Montreal Herald says: "The stock sent by Prince Edward Island is highly creditable to the tight little Province. The horses are all splendid animals, and have attracted attention and called forth admiration from all sides."

CLOW, the winner of the race at Summerside, travelled in thirty six hours, upwards of one hundred and ninety-five miles, or at the rate of about sixty-five miles a day, and about five and a half miles an hour. Not bad for an Islander! The "Unknown" is pretty fast, too.

MANY are curious to see what the Patriot will to-night say respecting the representation of Island productions at the Dominion Exhibition. On Thursday, it was silent as the grave, though the press of Montreal had published the most complimentary notices of our exhibit. Can it be that party influences cause this unpatriotic silence?

We learn that steps have been taken, by an influential gentleman, to bring to the notice of foreign capitalists—desiring to invest money in the Dominion—the special advantages of the Island for the production of the sugar beet, and the manufacture of beet root sugar. It is, we believe, undoubted that if the sugar beet can be profitably grown anywhere, it can be so grown in this Province. We hope the influences at work may bring about the establishment of this important industry in our midst.

THE Patriot is busy misrepresenting the facts in connection with the dinner tendered to the Hon. J. C. Pops by his friends in Prince County; But is significantly silent over the unaccomplished effort to honor Lieut. Governor Laird with a dinner on the occasion of his recent visit. The Patriot says the EXAMINER has not dared to deny its statements regarding the affair. The simple fact is that no representative of the EXAMINER, having received an invitation to the dinner, and no member of our staff being present at it, we knew nothing of the affair, and, therefore were not in a position either to affirm or deny anything respecting it. We however, accept the statement of the editor of the Progress, who was present. This statement it is needless to say is widely different from the hearsay reports of the disappointed office seekers to whose baseless stories the Patriot gives currency.

THE advocates and friends of woman's suffrage have arrived at widely different conclusions concerning the present status of that question in the various political parties. Mrs. Sara Andrews Spencer, of Washington, for reasons of political preference, has resigned the Secretaryship of the Woman's National Suffrage Association. She says the Republican party has been thoroughly educated on the woman question, seems well enough inclined, but dares not raise the issue in favor of woman suffrage before the people. Garfield, she says, stands in an attitude of respectful inquiry on the subject. Of the Democratic party recently in Convention at Cincinnati, she says, it treated them handsomely, but quite left the subject out of their platform; that they will give them chivalry to the end of time, but not an action of justice. The Greenback party, she says, has more courage than all the others combined.

If the "Shareholder and Insurance Gazette" is to be relied upon, Fire Insurance, as conducted in Canada by some companies, is by no means profitable to the proprietary. Notwithstanding the absence of any serious conflagrations during last year, it appears that some of the Insurance Companies in Canada have made little or no progress towards repairing the inroads which the two previous disastrous years had made in their respective capitals. We note from the "Shareholder" that the following Companies show an impairment of paid up capital:

This will leave a paid up capital, intact, to these Companies as follows:

The "National" is now in process of liquidation, but the others still continue the struggle. Such lamentable results as the foregoing must bespeak the underwriting of risks at inadequate rates, the acceptance of undesirable risks, or loose, reckless and

extravagant management generally. We quite agree with the "Shareholder" that, in the interest of the public, such companies should be required to make good the deficiency in their capitals, or should discontinue issuing policies.
