The Transvaal War

BURIED UNION JACK.

A "SAD" SCENE WHEN ENGLAND RETIRED IN 81.

The English flag was buried at Pretoria in 1881. It was a Union Jack that was placed under ground, and John Scoble thus describes the incident:

I was the editor of the Transvaal Argus, a paper which ceased publication shortly after the retrocession of the Transvaal to the Boer government. When we loyalists found that all hope had passed away of the Gladstone ministry carrying out the promises made with regard to the permanence of British rule in the province of the Transvaal, a number of British subjects met together to decide upon some sort of protest which should be at once striking and capable of being remembered. The idea of burying the British flag at the very moment when the formal act of retrocession was being signed, and in view of the room in government house where the shameful act of betrayal was being completed, was decided upon.

"It is unnecessary to say that the interment of the flag under which we fought and endured the hardships of a siege was not intended as an act of dishonor or repudiation, but was simply as the burial of an old and honored friend for whom we felt the highest esteem and the most affectionate regard. The proposal met with acceptance, and a flag was procured and placed in a coffin and borne to the grave by about 600 whites and a following of some 200 Kaffirs belonging to the loyal chief Zwaartbooy. A grave had been prepared in the corner of a vacant lot, which could be seen from the room where Her Majesty's commissioners, Sir H. Robinson, Sir Evelyn Wood and Sir H. de Villiers, were engaged with the Boer representatives in putting the final touch to a deed which had led to the present most lamentable state of affairs in South Africa.

"When it was thought that the signing away of British honor and the destruction of British prestige and good faith had been completed, the coffin containing the beloved flag was lowered into the grave, and a funeral oration was pronounced by John Munro expressive of the sorrow felt by all present at the solemn and melancholy duty which had fallen to the share of Her Majesty's loyal subjects in the Transvaal. A tombstone was erected at the head of the grave, and the funeral cortege departed. I have before me the "in memoriam" card which was printed at the time, of which the following is a copy:—

IN LOVING MEMORY OF THE BRITISH FLAG IN THE TRANSVAAL, WHO DEPARTED THIS LIFE ON THE 2ND AUGUST, 1881, IN HIS FIFTH YEAR. "In other climes none knew thee but to love thee" RESURGAM.

"If the English troops enter Pretoria they will probably resurrect this flag and give it royal honors."


