LADIES HOME JOURNAL.

The Thanksgiving Ladies Home Journal marks the fifteenth anniversary of that widely read magazine, which now sells 850,000 copies each month, and its editor reviews its past and the unique heading, "Fifteen Years of Mistakes," revealing his plans for its improvement and for its greater usefulness in the future. A page of illustrations admirably typifies "Thanksgiving in the Country," and another of photographs is filled with suggestions for decorations, etc., for "Thanksgiving in the Church." "The Anecdotal Side of Mr. Moody" reveals the chief characteristics of the great Evangelist in a succession of interesting stories, and "My First Fight in the Jungle" is Henry M. Stanley's narrative of the first of his journeys into Africa. "How Richard Wagner Wrote His Operas" gives the nearest clearest and most interesting view of the famous composer that has yet been written. In "A Polish Fantasy" is told, in a beautiful and pathetic story, the early career of Paderewski.

The first chapters of Mary E. Wilkins' new serial are among the fiction features. Miss Wilkins reverses the novelist's usual order, and makes ludicrous the mistakes of city people in the country. Another that will be followed with keen interest is "The Girls of Camp Arcady," also beginning in November issue. It is sparkling, vivacious narrative of four girl breadwinners who live together in New York flat. "The Minister of Darthage" grows in interest, and "The Silk-Lined Girl" is a fascinating short piece of romance. There are innumerable, useful, practical articles. Of special interest to women is "Prize Dollar Dinners" for four people. By The Curtis Publishing Company, Philadelphia. One dollar per year, ten cents per copy.

LIPPINCOTT'S.

The complete novel in the November issue of Lippincott's, "A Triple Entanglement," by Mrs. Burton Harrison, has its scenes mainly in Spain and England. The hero is an American, whose course of true love does not by any means run smooth, but leads him into safe harbor at last. The tale is one of this favorite author's best, and perhaps the longest that has ever appeared in Lippincott's. "Mercer's Best Shot," as described by Joseph A. Altshuler was a very remarkable shot indeed, at an enemy whose shadow only could be seen. More vigor of conception and description has seldom been put into two pages.

J. Armoyn Knox, in "The Petrified Legs," revives and amplifies the Irish legend of Lough Neagh. "The Destroyer" is an allegory by Paul R. Heyl. Jessie F. O'Donnell gives an account of "The Horse in Folk-Lore." Paul Ward Beck describes "A Ute Funeral." "Fanciful Predictions of War" and "Our Soldiers' Songs" are the titles of two brief papers by William W. Crane. Jane Ellis Joy has a little essay, "The Craze for the Unconventional," and J. K. Wetherill another on "The Golden Gift," which is Imagination. "Oriental Stage-Craft" is considered by L. W. The familiar question "Who is Your Author," animadverted upon by Annie Steger Winston. The poetry of the number consists of quatrains by Julia Schaver and Mary E. Stuckney, and the couplets by Carrie Blake Morgan and Clarence Army.

RESULTS OF UNBELIEF.

Rev. Professor Burgess, M. A., of the Western University, London, Ontario, remarking on the paralyzing effects of national unbelief, spoke as follows regarding the Anglo-French disturbance: "Deriding eternal truth, rejecting Divine authority, France, under the sole guidance of national impulse and self-gratification, pursues her infatuated course, blind to the inevitable goal, unheeding the ominous writing on the wall. Many still remember how, some 30 years ago, in passion and fury, she madly rushed upon her fate, with every sign and circumstance pointing with unwavering finger to the awful day of Sedan. Five years thereafter, by the generous, the chivalrous intervention, of England, she was saved from virtual destruction at the hands of an implacable foe. What return has she made, what gratitude has she shown, her benefactor, her deliverer? Mischievous interference, persistent opposition, wanton provocation, reckless aggression! And now, forsooth, she would fain plunge into war with the power to whose disinterested friendship she is indebted, it is hardly too much to say, for her very existence as a nation! The internal condition of this unhappy country is known of all men, and unless experience is vanity, unless the teaching of history is altogether delusive, her misguided people, in the bitterness of humiliation, will, at no distant day, learn to appreciate the admonition of the Psalmist, 'Upon the ungodly He shall rain fire and brimstone, storm and tempest.' Verily, there is a God that judgeth the earth."

NEWS NOTES.

By the proclamation of the United States officer in command at Santiago it is ordained that in that district the courts of justice shall be open to all, that no private property shall be taken for public uses without compensation, that no accused person shall be compelled to give evidence against himself, or, again on the same charge, and that no criminal proceeding shall be begun without presumption of guilt, and that habeas corpus shall not needlessly be taken away. People are also given the right to say and print what they will, restrained only by their responsibility for damage they do.
