REGAINS 14-POINT SPREAD

Carver Moving Away Again

Apparently Parkdale's Orin Carver looked over his shoulder last week, saw young Merrill Pineau of the B.Y.C. moving up in the Island Senior Hockey League scoring race and decided to do something about it. Carver did something about it too and went out and picked up 11 more points for himself in 3 games to take once again a healthy 14-point spread over Pineau in his brother's, coach and linemate Allie Carver tied for second.

Orin regained the lead in the goal scoring department now having 33 whittles together with his 21 assists, gives him 57 points. Pineau is second in the goal department with 31 and tied with 6 points with Allie Carver.

Skip Carver also moved up fast and now has 36 points. He is following Billy Hughes and Apps Arsenault of Montague each with 34.

Buck Whitlock and Jack Ready of B.Y.C. and Montague coach Bobby Dowling are next in line with 32.

Coke Grady has 27 assists, tops for the league in that department. Grady is highest scorer of Summerside Aces having 19 goals to go along with his assists total for 23 points. He only gets one-half point for goals and assists.

Frank Roper is alone at the head of the goalenders, having allowed 71 goals in 15 games for an average of 4.73. The Parkdale team average is also the league's best at 4.94 Earl Shepherd of St. Dunstan's moved into the second slot with an average of 5.44.

Steeplechaser Retires At 36

LONDON (AP)—Dick Francis, steeplechase jockey for royalty, retired Wednesday at 36.

Francis was aboard Queen Mother Elizabeth's Devon Loch when he slipped and fell only 40 feet from the finish line of the Grand National steeplechase last March at Aintree.

Devon Loch was far in front of the field when he went down. Injuries in a later race forced Devon Loch's scratching last week from the 1957 Grand National.

Francis was injured Jan. 11 when a horse kicked him.

Predicted Four Would Run 4-Min. Mile—One To Go

EAST ORANGE, N.J. (AP)—Distance runner Fred Dwyer Jr., who has never quite grasped track greatness, is relentlessly driving himself to fulfill a two-year-old prophecy and become the first American to run a four-minute mile.

Franz Stampfl, the canny Viennese track coach who helped Roger Bannister crack the four-minute mile, in 1955 named four runners to follow the English doctor through the coveted time barrier—and Dwyer is the only one who hasn't made it yet.

The other three—John Landy of Australia and Brian Hewson and Chris Chataway of England—have filled the bill.

Dwyer, however, announced in December he would make it this season, which he says "might easily be my last" as a runner.

The 25-year-old greeting card salesman opened his first full winter indoor campaign since 1953 with a stunning 8:52.4 two-mile victory over Laszlo Tabori in the Hungarian's American debut at Boston three weeks ago.

"I think I'll be ready for a four-

minute-mile effort about April or May," says the five-foot, eight-inch, 140-pound runner. "I missed it by eight-tenths of a second last June and if I hadn't been bumped I might have made it then."

TWELVE A DAY
He started training seriously Sept. 20 and since has run a minimum of 12 miles for two hours, six days a week. When he started competing, he reduced his schedule by resting a day before meets.

Training harder than ever before, Dwyer packs away plenty of lean meat, gobbles vitamin pills at every opportunity and drinks up to two quarts of orange juice a day.

"I've got to build up my strength," he explains. "The four-minute mile is all a matter of strength. Last minute kick has nothing to do with it. I'll try to make it to the final quarter in three minutes, then pray to God to sustain me the rest of the way."

He also says that his attitude is more mature.

"I've lost the anxiety about running I had when I was in college," he says. "I'm older for one thing."

Young Canada Hockey Week Being Celebrated Feb. 4-12

MELVILLE, Sask. (CP)—Plans are well under way for Canada's biggest hockey observance week in history, Feb. 4-12.

Gordon Jukes, the man behind the promotion of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association's "Young Canada Hockey Week," says "it is evident that the men in charge of minor hockey in center across the land are solidly behind the observance."

The week, to promote minor hockey, is being sponsored by the CAHA, its branches and affiliates in the 10 provinces.

Jukes, second vice-president of the CAHA and chairman of its minor hockey committee, planned the details, circulated hundreds of brochures and appealed for backing to press, radio and television.

He is a weekly newspaper publisher and at his offices at the Melville Advance has received letters and messages telling what various centres are doing to observe the week.

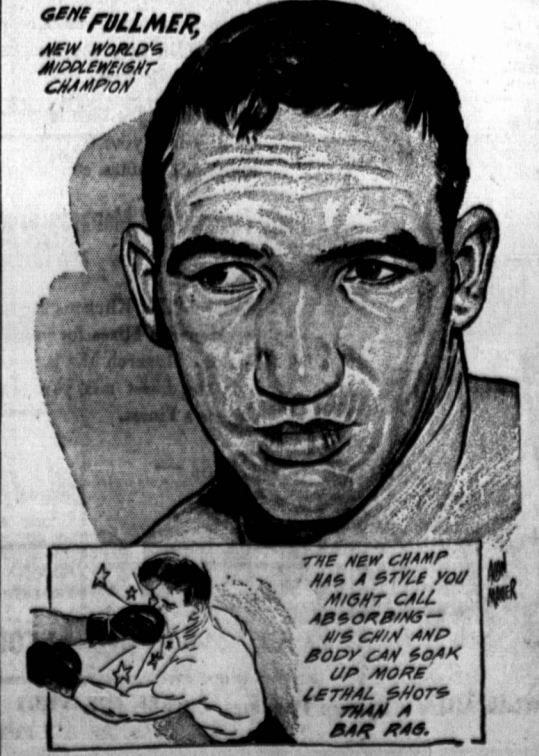
Government and civic officials are backing the idea, Jukes said, displaying a letter from Prime Minister St. Laurent that said:

"I was pleased to learn of the promotional activities being planned by the CAHA in connection with Young Canada Hockey Week. Canadians are justly proud of the records of their professional sport. But more important for our youth than the achievement of individual and team records is the development of the body and the character of each participant in this vigorous winter sport."
