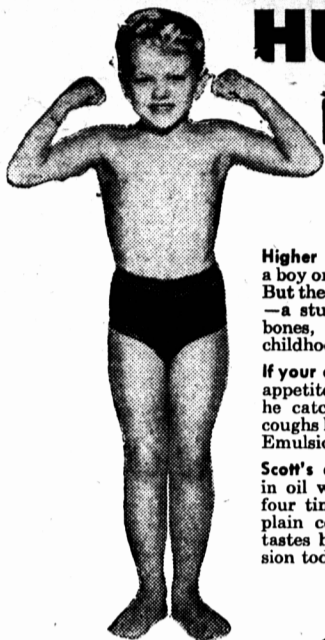

Claim Lawrence Creator Of Myth

LONDON (Reuters) — Publishers of a book to be published here this year claim that Lawrence of Arabia was the creator of a myth that was too readily believed by a credulous world.

The publishers, William Collins and Sons, say the book, by 61-year-old Richard Adlington, well-known novelist and biographer, will "erase Lawrence from the pages of history."

T. E. Lawrence, who died in a motorcycle crash in 1935, was widely accepted as a man who rallied desert tribes in the Middle East against the Turks in the First World War.

Encyclopedias and history books record Lawrence as a shy young archeologist who led the Arab tribes in their revolt. Much of the legend of his courage and stirring deeds comes from his own books, "The Seven Pillars of Wisdom" and "Revolt in the Desert."

Adlington says Lawrence played a much more minor part in the revolt than he claimed. He declares his researches have proved that "Seven Pillars of Wisdom" was "a work of quasi-fiction" rather than a factual account.

Adlington told his publishers he had tried to be fair to Lawrence. "But," he added, "I have not been able to conceal my indignation that such a man would have become one of the heroes of the war of 1914-1918."

Canada Will Not Trail In Atomic Power Projects

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canada will not be behind other countries in developing atomic power for industry, Trade Minister Howe told the Commons Tuesday.

Colin Cameron (COP—Nanaimo) had asked Mr. Howe who reports to Parliament for Atomic Energy of Canada Ltd., whether Canada is conducting experiments similar to Britain's to harness eht atom for industrial purposes.

Mr. Howe said the atomic energy plant at Chalk River, Ont., already has devoted its energies to research in peacetime uses of atomic power. Canada was not interested in developing atomic power for war purposes.

Research into industrial uses of atomic power was actively proceeding and considerable progress was being made.

Several hundred feet wide have shown content as high as 4.13 per cent in uranium.

"This find seems to be the most important in the province of Quebec to date," Mr. Johnston said.

He was informed of the discovery by a mining engineer of the Montreal Technical School.

The Quebec department of mines confirmed the find. It described it as an interesting one, offering good opportunities of development.
